15 first -- I guess we need a first motion for the

And then I guess -- I don't know

13

if anybody has a minute to -- have you read the

14

minutes from the last meeting?

MR. BRAUN: This is Kevin with the

16

Town of North Hempstead.

17

I make a motion to accept the

18

meeting minutes, unless anybody has any specific

19

comments?

20

CHAIR KEANE: I left mine

21

downstairs.

22

Do I have a second?

23

MS. HAAGENSON: I'll second.

24

CHAIR KEANE: Nora.

25

All those in favor?

1

2

(Chorus of "ayes.")

3

CHAIR KEANE: Oppose?

4

(No response.)

5

CHAIR KEANE: I see none.

6

Abstain?

7

(No response.)

8

CHAIR KEANE: I see none.

9

So the motion carries.

10

Thank you.

11

All right.

12

Sarah.

13

MS. DEONARINE: Okay. I don't

14

need to talk finances before we voted on the dues.

15

CHAIR KEANE: Do you want to share

16

anything on the screen?

17

MS. DEONARINE: Do you have it

18

open, No. 3A and 3B?

19

CHAIR KEANE: What do you mean, do

20

I have it open? I have the minutes that you sent.

21

MS. DEONARINE: Oh, so there is

22

also a drop box. So do you want to take over and I

23

can share my screen?

24

CHAIR KEANE: Sure.

25

MS. DEONARINE: So how do I check

1

2 --

3 CHAIR KEANE: Yeah, I keep looking
4 at the -- there's nobody in the waiting room. I
5 have the participants on the side showing who's
6 here and who's not.

7 MR. BRAUN: And we can just --
8 is -- will Jennifer Wilson Pines be here?

9 MS. DEONARINE: No, she had a
10 conflict.

11 CHAIR KEANE: Okay.

12 MS. DEONARINE: All right.

13 So do you see at the top MBPC 2020
14 budget?

15 CHAIR KEANE: Yes.

16 MS. DEONARINE: So -- so the
17 first column is the list of what we spent. The
18 second column is the annual budget. We started out
19 the year with over \$135,000 in our account and we
20 brought in the dues, we raised dues last year. We
21 received all the dues, thank you to everyone, with
22 an income of \$53,400.

23 So the second column is what we
24 budgeted.

25 And the third column is the

1

2 actual.

3

4 And obviously because of COVID,
5 there's a big discrepancy between what we've spent
6 and we expected to spend.

7

8 So the top line is income and then
9 orangey color is my salary. Blue is the difference
10 of -- (inaudible) event, which we didn't do this
11 year.

12

13 Purple is the expenses for the
14 website, which is a little misleading actually.
15 There's a couple of things that we need. \$2,000 was
16 the amount we set aside total, not necessarily the
17 annual amount but we only spent \$140 last year.

18

19 And then the light blue is the
20 project event, dues here. There was not very many
21 expenses because of COVID.

22

23 So if everything had been on
24 track, the last line -- so the mustard color is how
25 much we're expected to spend versus how we actually
26 did expend.

27

28 And the brown is about -- it's a
29 little misleading because if we had stayed on
30 target with our tax, we were going to spend more
31 than \$2,000 of what we brought in but we wouldn't

1

2 have negative \$2,000 in the account.

3

4 So we ended the year at \$170,000,
5 which -- it's getting high but I think we should
6 just work through our two grand then talk about
7 what we might want to use that money for.

8

9 CHAIR KEANE: I think we were also
10 talking about, you know, we may be tight with
11 expenses and everything else and raising the dues
12 or not raising the dues with respect to the outlay
13 of cash, so this helps us a little.

14

15 MS. DEONARINE: Yeah, exactly. I
16 wasn't expecting to be very tight this year. I
17 don't know if I expected that all because our -- it
18 looks like we're going to have more space between
19 when the DEC (inaudible) versus when we actually
20 start spending money on the DOS plan.

21

22 So both of those grants from the
23 State are such that we have to lay out the money
24 and then we get reimbursed. It was going to be
25 tight with how much we were laying out versus
getting reimbursed but COVID slowed everything down
and so it looks like it hit us for more and so
we'll be a bit tight. So that's why I suggested
moving forward the committee voted to keep the dues

1

2 the same this year.

3

4 Are there any questions about last
5 year's budget?

6

(No response.)

7

8 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. Now I have
9 to figure out how to switch which screen I'm
10 sharing.

11

All right.

12

13 So I'm bringing up the estimated
14 budget for this year.

15

So MBPC 2021.

16

CHAIR KEANE: Yeah.

17

18 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. So -- well,
19 this estimate (inaudible). So the income here as
20 it's broken down this time because we're going to
21 have income from more than one source. So usually
22 we only get income from dues but we'll also -- I'm
23 not expecting we're going to get reimbursed from
24 the DOS Water Quality Improvement Plan project this
25 year. I was very conservative in my estimation on
what's going to happen next year since COVID slowed
us down so much.

26

27 And -- but we should be getting
28 in -- I'm expecting we'll have our document order

1

2 DECs so we can claim over \$50,000 and get
3 reimbursed. And most of that we've already paid
4 for -- so that will be a plus.

5

MR. RICHARDSON: This is Don
6 Richardson. Does that dues' number that looks like
7 no change in dues for this year?

8

MS. DEONARINE: Correct.

9

MR. RICHARDSON: Is that -- okay.

10

MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. So salary
11 is at the same, a little less. I'm estimating
12 because I don't know what's going to happen this
13 year. (Inaudible) back to normal.

14

Expenses for the website. I'm
15 hoping to get more (inaudible) this year and then
16 under the blue is all the projects and events for
17 the upcoming year, which probably is an over
18 estimate actually.

19

I don't know that we're going to
20 be able to give the boat tour again. The Joint
21 Executive Committee is going to be virtual so there
22 won't be any expenses for that.

23

We do need to fix an educational
24 sign. We'll need to do some educational printing
25 and then I have a mailing for those.

And then if we go forward with upgrades to -- even that cost is there. And then the contractual services is what we're going to -- what I'm estimating all I've spent of the DOS grant but we won't have been reimbursed yet and that's \$18,000.

And then we already have spent \$31,000 from the DEC Water Quality Grant but that'll probably won't be reimbursed before the end of the year.

And then as submit for transcription and the -- (inaudible). Unfortunately, she hasn't been able to do much because of COVID.

CHAIR KEANE: Sarah, what has been the -- like a typical transcription cost?

MS. DEONARINE: It's been between \$100 and \$200.

CHAIR KEANE: Okay.

MS. DEONARINE: And we've had one that was -- when we had the kickoff meeting with DOS that one was \$400.

CHAIR KEANE: Okay.

And one other question from a

1

2 procedural standpoint, what do we have to do with
3 that transcript?

4 MS. DEONARINE: I've been posting
5 it on line.

6 CHAIR KEANE: Okay.

7 MS. DEONARINE: It's not easy to
8 find so I tried to post links to it on Facebook. I
9 put a link to it in our newsletter. And then I'm
10 hoping to sit down and order a new computer so
11 (inaudible).

12 CHAIR KEANE: Then I guess this is
13 about a procedural standpoint from the
14 transcription. Do they know who's talking during
15 the --

16 MS. DEONARINE: No.

17 CHAIR KEANE: I mean as a point of
18 order, should we like say who's talking. Like say
19 this is Bob Keane and I have Sarah.

20 MS. DEONARINE: We should. Yeah,
21 it's a good point.

22 CHAIR KEANE: Okay.

23 MS. DEONARINE: All right.

24 CHAIR KEANE: All right.

25 Sorry about the interruption. I'm

1

2 just trying to get an idea what we've been spending
3 so far.

4

MS. DEONARINE: I hasn't been much
5 this year.

6

Any questions about expenses for
7 the upcoming year?

8

(No response.)

9

CHAIR KEANE: I have one more
10 question, Sarah.

11

What about -- do we have any sort
12 of estimate for our time as it matches the revenue?
13 Or is that --

14

MS. DEONARINE: It's not really a
15 budget -- for my position it would for -- and it's
16 figured in here for DEC some of my -- will get
17 reimbursed. But other than that time isn't figured
18 into the budget.

19

CHAIR KEANE: Okay.

20

Thank you.

21

MS. DEONARINE: All right.

22

Are we good with that one?

23

CHAIR KEANE: Yes.

24

MS. DEONARINE: Okay.

25

So then moving on to -- so then

1

2 we'll move on to the dues.

3

4 So November or October we set the
5 dues as the same as last year but we have to do a
6 final vote tonight. We have a 60-day review period
7 and sent out letters to all the municipalities.
8 Everyone is in favor, although I did hear back from
9 Plandome Village, Dianne?

9

MS. SHEEHAN: Plandome Heights.

10

MS. DEONARINE: Plandome Heights.

11

Yeah.

12

13 MS. SHEEHAN: You're going to get
14 the same letter every year. He just needs to
15 express it. But we're going to pay our dues but he
16 just needs to let you know how he feels.

16

17 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. So I
18 apologize, I should have pulled up that letter to
19 read to you. But it's -- it's about the dues
20 structure again and how all the villages pay the
21 same amount when some villages are very large and
22 some are very small.

22

23 But everyone's still paying their
24 dues.

24

25 MR. ERTEL: Do you need a motion,
Sarah?

1

2

MS. DEONARINE: Yes.

3

4

MR. ERTEL: This is Mike Ertel
from the Village of Sands Point.

5

6

7

I make a motion to finalize the
2021 dues at the same levels as 2021, pursuant to
Sarah's description of the budget and expenses.

8

9

MR. FUCCI: This is Dan Fucci.

I'll second it.

10

CHAIR KEANE: I think just for one
point of clarification, do we have to say -- to
finalize the 2021 dues to be the same as 2020?

13

MS. DEONARINE: Thank you.

14

CHAIR KEANE: So as amended.

15

And that was seconded by Dan.

16

All in favor?

17

(Chorus of "ayes.")

18

CHAIR KEANE: Oppose?

19

(No response.)

20

CHAIR KEANE: Abstain?

21

(No response.)

22

CHAIR KEANE: I see none.

23

So that motion carries.

Well, the next one -- why, Dan, what is the slang term for our multi-parameter water quality monitoring program. We've had it for two years. We did not use it this past year. And the company actually recommends having it maintained every year.

So the cost -- so the cost is \$460 for service. They look at the whole thing, the hand-held part and the sign. It doesn't include any parts that need to be replaced but we would get a ten percent discount on parts. They're running an end of the year special, supposedly. So the service is \$460 and then a ten percent discount on any parts needed.

Since we never sent it in for service, it's probably a good idea to have it checked out. I'd really recommend it. There are seals -- and internal seals that can dry out and it's a good idea and have them inspected and replaced every couple of years.

And then the prices they are quoted me are good until (inaudible) -- so.

MALE VOICE: The second number, actually \$400, are you sure that's enough for

1

2 parts? In speaking with them, is that like the
3 most it can be or can it be more than that?

4 MS. DEONARINE: I suppose it could
5 be more than that. But I just estimated.

6 CHAIR KEANE: Just for the sake of
7 the group, do you remember how much a new meter
8 would cost?

9 MS. DEONARINE: It was over seven
10 grand.

11 CHAIR KEANE: And do you remember
12 what it actually monitors?

13 MS. DEONARINE: Yes. So we got
14 one that monitors a lot. It monitors developed
15 oxygen, temperature, it gives the gps coordinates,
16 salinity, specific (inaudible). We didn't do
17 nutrients because that one's complicated. Oh, PH.

18 MR. BRAUN: It also does DO as a
19 relative to the temperature. It does four or five
20 parameters that every wire side does.

21 CHAIR KEANE: I get it. I viewed
22 them. It's just for the group and I think as any
23 environmental monitor or piece of equipment, it's
24 always good, you know, what you can use it for.

25 So obviously you have to get it

1

2 calibrated or checked every so often because if
3 you're going to be using those measurements and
4 numbers, you want to --

5

MR. BRAUN: Bob, there's a
6 calibration that -- that they do in the field all
7 the time.

8

My question is, Sarah, is there
9 anything wrong with the wire side?

10

MS. DEONARINE: No, not as far as
11 I know.

12

MR. BRAUN: Okay.

13

MS. DEONARINE: It's been sitting
14 for the past year. It only goes out on the boat.

15

MR. BRAUN: But you changed the
16 membrane. You have the membrane kit and that thing
17 that you screw in and put a little solution and
18 open.

19

MS. DEONARINE: Yeah, I have all
20 that but I haven't changed the membrane yet.

21

MR. BRAUN: Okay. Well, I have no
22 problem with -- with the -- with the maintenance
23 call but it's a lot like you updating your computer
24 virus software. You don't have a problem. You
25 usually don't have an issue with it.

1

2

So if you want to get it updated,

3

that's fine.

4

I'll make the motion.

5

This is Kevin Braun from the Town

6

of North Hempstead that's making the motion to go

7

ahead and spend an additional \$400 -- or not to

8

exceed \$400 for a wire side cleansing, I guess.

9

CHAIR KEANE: There's actually a

10

motion on the agenda, if you have the agenda.

11

MR. BRAUN: Yeah, I've got like

12

four screens in front of me so you're going to have

13

to give me a second.

14

CHAIR KEANE: Okay. Like I said,

15

if you wanted to read that.

16

MR. BRAUN: Okay. Hold on.

17

MALE VOICE: I can do it if you

18

want?

19

MR. BRAUN: Yeah, that's fine.

20

Thank you.

21

MALE VOICE: This is Don

22

Richardson.

23

I'll make a motion to for the --

24

MS. DEONARINE: Wait. Don had a

25

question.

1
2 MR. RICHARDSON: Two suggested
3 amendments that might, you know, eliminate the need
4 to make a second motion. And that is we decided, I
5 think that this should be done annually so why not
6 stick that in this language so that we don't have
7 to repeat this every year unless we want to amend
8 it. That would be my first suggestion. And that
9 would be, I guess, water quality sampling each
10 year, or annually.

11 And the other suggestion I have is
12 to raise the \$400 to \$500. If we're going to do
13 this, we're probably going to have to pay the
14 extra, if necessary. So to anticipate maybe a
15 little inflation in that, simply say not to exceed
16 an additional \$500 or as amended in a future
17 meeting if that's necessary.

18 Then we can leave -- this language
19 the same each year and just re-approve it.

20 MS. DEONARINE: So you're
21 recommending adding annually after professional for
22 \$460 toward professional service of \$460 annually?
23 Or just --

24 MR. RICHARDSON: Well, one or more
25 of those. Yeah, just to --

MR. BRAUN: I just, we don't know what it's going to cost year by year so to give it a \$500 limit in perpetuity for years and years, I think that may be a problem if we have to do -- I think we should address as it comes.

In addition, I don't think we need to do this on a yearly basis, even though it's recommended. So I think we should address this on a year by year basis, based upon the cost that be associated with it at that time.

CHAIR KEANE: Right. I think the \$500 was just thrown out there to avoid to have to talk about it each time. Obviously, if it's going to be \$1,000, we couldn't approve that until we had a meeting -- so if there's something major, we'd have to come back and vote on it anyway.

I think the \$500 was sort of an allotment for lighter repairs.

MR. BRAUN: That's fine. \$500 is just the fact that we're going to do this not on a yearly basis and do it into the future. I think we should look at this yearly if anything comes up.

MR. ERTEL: This Mike Ertel.

1

2 Since there's an objection, why not just do it
3 annually then, you know, either way we're going to
4 have to remember to do it. So it's going to come
5 up at a meeting. So whether we vote on it or not,
6 the issue will be if we don't have a quorum. So I
7 would say just go ahead --

8

MR. RICHARDSON: Or we could say
9 necessary expenditures as approved -- I'm sorry.
10 This is Don Richardson.

11

To approve the cleaning and I
12 would just say add expenditures approved annually
13 or something like that. That way avoid this whole
14 dollar limit and just say, okay, this is going to
15 be done annually and with the dollar amount to be
16 set -- something like that.

17

CHAIR KEANE: I think the only
18 part, like I said -- this is Bob Keane. The only
19 part that -- so that if we send it out and then
20 they say it's going to cost \$20 to fix. Well, I
21 can't do it until I get an approval for \$20.

22

So I think (inaudible) was really
23 just set in there so that there could be limited
24 small repairs done without having to come back to
25 the board, having a quorum and then it could be two

1

2 months or whatever it is and then they're already
3 starting to monitor and YSI --

4

MALE VOICE: Perfect. Did
5 everyone understand that? So that's fine with me.

6

CHAIR KEANE: So if we change that
7 dollar amount to whatever the board feels
8 comfortable with and I think it was really just
9 thrown in there as like a -- some small amount so
10 that it can't be near (inaudible) agree upon. But
11 I think it was set up so that it gets calibrated.
12 They come back and they say, you need five new
13 seals. It's so many dollars and I would say, okay,
14 I'm authorized up to \$500. Repair it and have it
15 sent back.

16

MR. RICHARDSON: I'm beginning to
17 think -- this is Don again. I'm beginning to think
18 that maybe I should just withdraw my suggestion.

19

(Laughter.)

20

CHAIR KEANE: It's an easy thing.

21

MR. RICHARDSON: (Inaudible.)

22

CHAIR KEANE: All right.

23

MR. ERTEL: I'm just going to take
24 and push forward. This is Mike Ertel and I'm from
25 Sands Point.

I make a motion to have a YSI multi-parameter probe used for water, water quality settling to be professionally serviced for \$460 and repaired as needed but not to exceed an additional \$500.

7

CHAIR KEANE: Do we have a second?

9

10

MR. RICHARDSON: This is Don Richardson.

11

I'll second that.

12

CHAIR KEANE: Thank you.

13

All in favor?

14

(Chorus of "ayes.")

15

CHAIR KEANE: Oppose?

16

(No response.)

17

CHAIR KEANE: Abstain?

18

(No response.)

19

CHAIR KEANE: That motion carries.

20

Thank you.

21

MR. BRAUN: Yeah, I apologize for my language, I didn't mean I disagree. I just wanted to bring up a point.

24

CHAIR KEANE: That's fine.

25

And next year's maintenance might

1

2 not be \$460 so rather than, you know

3

All right.

4

So IMI.

5

MS. DEONARINE: IMA.

6

CHAIR KEANE: IMA. Sorry.

7

MS. DEONARINE: IMA stands for

8

Intermunicipal Agreements. And we have to do it

9

every five years and we have to get it done this

10

year. Unfortunately, Nassau County just passed it

11

a year ago. It's a long process and we have to

12

start it over again.

13

So --

14

CHAIR KEANE: One quick question,

15

Sarah.

16

What's -- is there a deadline that

17

we have to have this approved by?

18

MS. DEONARINE: Well, the last

19

time we signed it was 2016 and I figure it's the

20

end of this year.

21

CHAIR KEANE: No, but I was saying

22

as a general comment, like just the scheduling of

23

our time frames for reviewing and then finally

24

approving and then sending it out. Is there some

25

sort of time frame for that?

MR. RICHARDSON: This is Don Richardson. I've never seen a time limit. We've had a couple of IMAs and I think it's kind of loose.

(Overlapping conversation.)

MS. DEONARINE: The last time we --

MR. BRAUN: Hi, this is Kevin, Town of North Hempstead.

Just for the benefit of the committee, the agreement carries over. It's just a question of when we redo it. It's not going to disappear. It's not going to change. It's loose in its interpretation. It's going to continue. But the idea is we try to get it done within five years because it means that everything dissolves.

MS. DEONARINE: My understanding, the last time we did this was that it had to be renewed every five years according to State law.

MR. ERTEL: This is Mike Ertel, Sands Point. I thought we discussed this last year. We kind of looked at the agreement and then we kind of decided, look, unless something's absolutely off, the best thing to do is just keep

1

2 it as is because we need Nassau County approval.
3 We need this approval, that approval, you know,
4 municipalities.

5

6 So I would just suggest that if
7 we're looking at this, don't consider (inaudible)
8 for many reasons. If you really need something,
9 otherwise, I'd say just kind of consider just
10 maintaining it as it is.

11

MR. BRAUN: I agree 100 percent.

12

MR. RICHARDSON: This is Don
13 Richardson. I think if we're complying with what
14 we're doing here, then there needs to be a
15 statement made at a board meeting or somehow in the
16 minutes saying that the board has reviewed the IMA
17 and the decision is that they'll be no changes
18 necessary, something like that. Just so there is a
19 record, yes we did upgrade it or renew it every
20 five years.

21

MALE VOICE: Agreed.

22

MS. DEONARINE: So I did have some
23 suggested changes that aren't just nitty gritty or
24 nitpicking. At one point something seemed to
25 contradict somewhere else. And then there's also
the concern that every year when we pass the dues,

1

2 we hear back from the villages and we get the push
3 back from the villages and so I thought we should
4 address that head on.

5 So and we had a discussion a year
6 ago and we were going to keep the dues structure
7 and the IMA the same. And so I had suggested a
8 letter to -- addressed to the villages explaining
9 that and then giving them a chance to comment at
10 our March meeting.

11 MS. BRAUN: So -- this is Kevin
12 from the Town of North Hempstead.

13 I'm going to try to go through
14 this quickly because I don't know if this needs a
15 lot of discussion. Is the only push back coming
16 from the Village of Plandome, which once again said
17 they only the needed to express their concern and
18 not necessarily need to do it. Because it that's
19 the only -- we've clearly got it from the village
20 that that's what they're going to express and I
21 don't know if we need to re-lawyer this thing based
22 upon the one village's concern.

23 MS. DEONARINE: So I'm not sure if
24 Plandome -- I think one of the other Plandomes,
25 definitely Ken (inaudible) has said something and

1

2 Thomas Phillips. Jill's not in the waiting room,
3 is she?

4

MR. BRAUN: Actually, (inaudible)
5 is.

6

I mean, I'm sort of all right with
7 this a little bit. In relaying the fact that
8 although this is a new group of people, for the
9 most part this has been batted around between every
10 lawyer and every village town attorney and I don't
11 know if this is enough to really want to revisit
12 the dues structure.

13

MR. ERTEL: This is Mike Ertel,
14 Sands Point again.

15

I can't believe that Kevin and I
16 agree so much today. However, you know, we are
17 representatives for our villages. So to the extent
18 that we're reviewing, I think the onus is on us to
19 go back to our village and to see if there's any
20 items. And I think that opening up a letter like
21 that invites the nuisance but is not necessary
22 because we know our representatives, whether it's
23 Nassau County or the village of such and such or
24 whatever municipality you represent. But is that
25 sufficient and we are looking at it and if I have

1

2 an issue, I go to my mayor or I go to my village
3 attorneys and I can talk with them if I have a
4 problem with it.

5

MS. DEONARINE: That's a good
6 point. The committee should cooperate. But, you
7 know --

8

(Overlapping conversations.)

9

MS. DEONARINE: There are two
10 villages who, I think, complained or not complained
11 or have spoken out --

12

MR. BRAUN: Sarah, let's put
13 complained and if they do not want to pay the dues,
14 they have every right to pull out of the committee
15 and lose all their (inaudible) contribution from
16 the committee.

17

FEMALE VOICE: That's the point
18 that I've made out to our mayor. He agrees. He
19 just feels the need to let you know. I don't think
20 he understood how complex it is to change the
21 structure and I'll bring that to his attention.

22

We gladly pay the dues. He just
23 needs to vent.

24

MR. ERTEL: And these meetings are
25 not only open to all the representatives and

1

2 municipalities but to the public. So anyone who
3 comes to attend this meeting to discuss and review
4 and put in their opinion as well.

5

FEMALE VOICE: I'll let him know.

6

(Overlapping conversation.)

7

FEMALE VOICE: He used to come

8

years ago.

9

MS. DEONARINE: I think Kevin's

10

got a million meetings a day on his book. It is

11

tax season.

12

CHAIR KEANE: I think Don had a

13

question.

14

MR. RICHARDSON: Yeah, this is

15

Don.

16

I think it makes sense for us, the

17

committee at that time, to look every five years,

18

look at the arrangement, the IMA, and see if we

19

think something should be included, maybe without

20

question, for example, electronic signatures.

21

Do you really think if we allow

22

electronic signatures, that anybody is going to

23

object? So if we get an opinion that we need,

24

perhaps on that, just include it and say we're

25

making the following changes rather than get

1

2 extraneous comments from every village about
3 everything.

4

5 You know, start out with
6 something like we plan to review the IMA with the
7 following suggestions. And include what we want in
8 there and let them reply to us if they need
9 something else. Somebody make that initial
10 statement. Let's not leave it wide open. If they
11 need something, have them speak up.

12

13 But maybe there's something we
14 think should be included so in that case perhaps we
15 should just recommend those.

16

17 MR. BRAUN: This is Kevin with the
18 Town of North Hempstead.

19

20 Again, the problem with that and
21 this is with all due respect to the lawyers on the
22 committee here, is once you ask a lawyer to
23 comment, they are going to comment.

24

25 MR. RICHARDSON: I'm trying to get
rid of that.

26

27 MR. BRAUN: So I'm going towards
28 looking at the other aspects of the document and
29 then going ahead to approve it. Because that's
30 what Sarah's looking for at this meeting right now.

1

2 I mean, if we want to go through different stuff, I
3 mean, I think there's a minor thing that she
4 brought up that we can fix. But the dues structure
5 you're going to -- I'm sorry, I'm going to hit my
6 head against the wall a dozen times going through
7 this unless we say that this is okay for now and
8 that if they don't want it, they can leave.

9

I mean, that's in the IMA.

10

MR. RICHARDSON: Okay. Well, what
11 about simply bringing that to the committee for any
12 answers to these questions that she's raised --

13

MR. BRAUN: Well, I could go
14 through that now.

15

MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.

16

MR. RICHARDSON: Okay.

17

(Overlapping conversation.)

18

MR. BRAUN: Sorry.

19

MS. DEONARINE: Does the committee
20 want more time to look at these or do you want to
21 do them right now?

22

(Overlapping conversation.)

23

MR. BRAUN: I mean if you wanted
24 to go through the questions, I mean, I'll just give
25 my perspective from someone who's done this a

1

2 couple of times but if you want to discuss it
3 further, you can discuss individual questions.
4 That's fine. But I can go through a couple of the
5 questions and maybe answer them if needed, if
6 that's okay.

7

CHAIR KEANE: Well, Sarah, what
8 was your intent on this line item? Were you going
9 to talk about possible items?

10

MS. DEONARINE: Well, I was
11 thinking of setting March as the official time to
12 discuss the IMA but we could -- I mean, so this
13 committee has expressed the same sentiment about
14 not opening the discussion of the dues structure
15 and whether -- and we make the decision.

16

So if you just want to look at the
17 suggested edits I made and we can talk about those
18 right now.

19

These were things I caught and
20 really the only really important one is that
21 paragraph 13 and 21 seem to contradict each other.

22

MR. BRAUN: I actually read that
23 again and I don't think they do.

24

MS. DEONARINE: Okay.

25

MR. BRAUN: I can explain why I

1

2 think it is and I was hoping Jennifer would be on
3 here because she was -- she was here during the
4 original IMA discussion but if I can go through
5 this real quick while I'm looking at -- if you guys
6 want to all do this another five years, you can.
7 If not, you don't. Okay. That's (inaudible) to
8 me.

9 And then 21 basically says if you
10 want to go on, you have to have at least half of
11 the membership. So I don't know if it contradicts
12 like you think. Thirteen is saying, we all want to
13 give this up, we can give this up and the
14 committee's gone. And then 21 says, if you want to
15 continue, you've got to have at least half the
16 people involved and then the dues structure
17 changes.

18 So I don't know necessarily if
19 this is a contradiction. I think this was put in by
20 the original attorneys that were involved in
21 drafting the IMA and I think it has two distinct
22 purposes.

23 MS. DEONARINE: Does everybody
24 have the draft IMA in front of them or needs the
25 draft IMA in front of them?

1

2

MR. RICHARDSON: Don Richardson.

3

I don't have to have that draft.

4

FEMALE VOICE: Well, it's in the

5

drop box; right?

6

MS. DEONARINE: Yes.

7

FEMALE VOICE: It's six IMA

8

changes.

9

MS. DEONARINE: Okay. I can share

10

my screen. Let me see if I can split so you can

11

see 13 and 21 at the same time.

12

CHAIR KEANE: So is that saying

13

need consent to continue it?

14

MS. DEONARINE: We're reading

15

this now and it doesn't seem like we have -- I have

16

to redo the whole IMA.

17

So the question is do No. 13 and

18

21 contradict each other? And if not, then we can

19

just put the IMA back out there and --

20

CHAIR KEANE: If we put the IMA

21

back out there, do we need some sort of

22

notification or something from the members?

23

MS. DEONARINE: I think they have

24

to respond again. Well, we could send the letter

25

that's exactly the same as the (inaudible).

1

MR. BRAUN: Basically, the only thing you need to do is provide it to each -- provide it to each village and town and they sign it. And then Nassau County is the last one to sign it. That's how it works.

MALE VOICE: I just don't know with this -- this is going to have to go before the County Legislature.

MALE VOICE: Can we interpret the term consent in paragraph 13, as paying your dues? They're continuing to pay their dues --

(Overlapping conversation.)

MALE VOICE: I'm sorry. Go ahead.

MR. BRAUN: I said that's exactly what I think it means. Consent is paying your dues, saying you're in or saying your out.

MS. DEONARINE: So then that -- you would say every year paying their dues renews the IMA so that we don't actually have to send it out again for signature?

MR. BRAUN: No. The IMA is renewed every five years. The fact that at any time within that five years you have to review to see if the people want to still be in -- the villages want to

1

2 still be in. They can pull out but that doesn't
3 change the IMA. That just changes the percentages
4 in the IMA in terms of what villages are going to
5 pay and what the town is going to pay and what the
6 county is going to pay.

7 MALE VOICE: And to split hairs,
8 13 states, shall commence upon execution of this
9 agreement. So that means signing for the county,
10 the town and the municipality and then it shall be
11 extended by consent. If the intention is without
12 execution again after five years, then (inaudible)
13 state its position again and additional execution
14 for signature, which is not consistent within this
15 paragraph 13.

16 MR. RICHARDSON: Don Richardson.
17 Point of order, if someone does pay their dues,
18 what termination provisions are there in the IMA?
19 I don't recall.

20 MS. DEONARINE: Well, it has to do
21 with they have to withdraw before -- well, before
22 the vote, which is prior to them finalizing of the
23 dues. And then they -- there's no penalty. But
24 after we voted to finalize the dues then they still
25 have to pay the dues.

1

2

MR. RICHARDSON: Is there any
penalty for not paying -- let's say the third year,
if somebody just doesn't pay or 180 days later --

5

MR. BRAUN: No, there's no penalty.
There's no penalty. It's written up to be that
kind of agreement. If you don't want in, you don't
get in. That's it. It's not punitive is the words
I'm looking for.

10

MALE VOICE: All right.

11

MR. RICHARDSON: I'm sorry to keep
butting in. This is Don Richardson.

13

If there's a reason to go ahead
with a transcript, we keep forgetting to give our
name first and having dealt with transcribers and
so forth, they will yell about every two minutes if
we don't keep doing this.

18

MR. BRAUN: They can't yell at us
on Zoom.

20

(Overlapping conversation.)

21

MR. RICHARDSON: So what's the
decision? This is Don.

23

MS. DEONARINE: I don't know.

24

MR. BRAUN: Once again, I'm going
to offer to go through the other comments. I do

25

1

2 believe that this has been through -- I'm sorry.

3 This is Kevin from the Town of North Hempstead.

4

I'm going to suggest that for the
5 last 15 years this document has been -- I'm sorry,
6 the last 20 years, this document has been
7 sufficient amongst the county, the town and the
8 villages.

9

Now there could be some other
10 updates but I don't think necessarily the perceived
11 comfort between 13 and 21 is really enough to get
12 into it.

13

I think there's other less
14 substantial changes that could be made if the
15 committee feels so. But I don't think that -- I
16 don't see a conflict in terms, especially since me
17 knowing how this has gone before all the attorneys
18 in the villages and the town and the county and
19 knowing that this has been approved, it passed. I
20 don't think we should change that.

21

MR. ERTEL: Mike Ertel, Sands
22 Point.

23

The question for the members who
24 have been here much longer than me, has anything in
25 this agreement impeded or hindered this group's

1

2 ability to do what we try to do? Has it ever
3 created an impediment for us?

4

MR. BRAUN: No.

5

CHAIR KEANE: No.

6

7 I think the only potential
8 conflict or question that came up was when we we're
9 raising the dues, what were the percentages and
10 what the actual numbers and were they really in
11 line with the IMA.

12

Sorry. This is Bob Keane.

13

14 You know, I remember when we were
15 playing with the numbers because we said, okay,
16 it's going to be a five percent increase but then
17 that five percent increased changed the percentages
18 in the IMA from what the county the mutualities and
19 the villages were paying.

20

That was the only thing that I

21

think, the biggest item that we had.

22

MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.

23

24 CHAIR KEANE: But other than that,
25 and I've been here for a long time and I don't
think this agreement -- we've never come back to
this and said, oh, we can't do this because of the
IMA or some provision in the IMA that would have

1

2 precluded us from doing something.

3

4 I think when there's been a lot of
5 questions, like did we have bylaws or something and
6 that question kind of keeps coming back and we're
7 not sure or I think there is one. But I don't
8 think this has ever caused us any problems.

8

9 MR. BRAUN: Once again, this is
10 Kevin from the Town of North Hempstead.

10

11 I'm going to reiterate if there's
12 any particular large need to change this provision,
13 I say we keep it as it is and we move on.

13

14 The term -- I just -- I think
15 we're going too long with this. If there is -- if
16 the committee feels that there is a further need to
17 revise or look at this, that's fine.

17

18 I'm saying no. But we've got to
19 make a decision on this instead of discussing it.

19

20 CHAIR KEANE: Once again, this is
21 Bob Keane. So I guess the question for Sarah is,
22 for the groups' understanding, does the IMA need to
23 be resubmitted to every village for signatures in
24 2021?

24

25 MS. DEONARINE: That was my
understanding.

1

2

MR. BRAUN: Yes. Done.

3

CHAIR KEANE: Okay.

4

5

MR. FUCCI: For the county -- this is Dan Fucci. Whether we amend this or not, obviously it won't matter because if every municipality needs to sign, and I believe the county signs last, it's going to have to be reviewed through the county, I assume.

It might even need legislative approval again.

MS. DEONARINE: Would it be easier to go through if nothing changes in it?

MR. FUCCI: That I'll have to find out. If we don't make any changes to the IMA, I'd still have to -- because the County Executive, I believe, signs and I believe the legislature has to authorize the County Exec to sign into the agreement.

Obviously if there's no changes, it will be easier when dealing with the county attorneys, I believe, because they were okay with it the last time.

And the one thing the Comptroller looked at this last time, they wanted to make sure

1

2 that we were in that -- what is it, the 45 percent,
3 I believe, the county pays.

4

MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.

5

MR. FUCCI: They would like --

6

MS. DEONARINE: Forty-five.

7

MR. FUCCI: Forty-five percent.

8 Yeah, they wanted to make sure that that was in
9 place because if there was any deviation, they
10 would have rejected the claim. So I know that's
11 very important to follow that protocol.

12

13 But, again, as far as signatures
14 are concerned, I don't think it's going to -- it's
15 still going to have to go through a process because
16 I believe, and I'll have to confirm this -- I'll
17 try and confirm it in the next few days and get
18 back to, Sarah, but I believe the County Exec signs
19 it and it has to go to the Legislature, I believe.
I'll find out.

20

21 Not that we can't do it, it just
makes things more difficult.

22

MR. BRAUN: This is Kevin Braun

23

from the Town of North Hempstead.

24

25 Speaking from the Town's point of
view, if you do not change a document that the Town

1

2 is comfortable with already, it moves through
3 faster.

4

MR. FUCCI: Right. Because it's
5 not an amendment, I guess. If you make changes to
6 this document it's an amendment to the IMA, which I
7 know definitely is a long process. We're getting
8 soil and water done on Monday, how long did that
9 take? That was a large amendment though -- so.

10

I'll have to find out and I'll
11 talk to the county attorneys. If there are no
12 changes to the document, what is the process?

13

MR. BRAUN: From the Town's
14 perspective, Town of North Hempstead, if there's
15 minor changes like just changing the water quality
16 document or something like that, that does not
17 change the function of the IMA, it does not change
18 the dues structure, it does not the full majority
19 of what we're trying to do here. So it moves
20 forward through the Town easier.

21

CHAIR KEANE: And this is Bob
22 Keane. And I think we are going to make a change,
23 then I would change that five year thing to ten
24 years.

25

(Overlapping conversation.)

1

2

MR. BRAUN: It's a State

3

requirement.

4

CHAIR KEANE: I understand. I was

5

joking.

6

You know, and the other thing

7

could have been after the last signature but that

8

doesn't matter either -- so.

9

So where do we go from here? Do

10

we make a motion to accept it as is and push it out

11

or are we going to table this until we -- until Dan

12

talks to the county? What's the board looking to

13

do?

14

Or, Sarah, what are you looking

15

for us to do?

16

MS. DEONARINE: Whatever the

17

committee's most comfortable with.

18

MR. BRAUN: This is Kevin from the

19

Town of North Hempstead.

20

Once again, I'm willing to go

21

through the minor edits if you want to do that,

22

some items and I can tell you my opinion on it.

23

But for the major issues of what you described in

24

changing the structure, or the conflicts that you

25

see between 13 and 21 and the -- and the dues

1

2 structure, I think we keep that as is.

3

4 So once again, I'm going to offer
5 going through the other edits quickly so my
6 perspective and I hope it helps the committee as a
7 whole.

8

9 CHAIR KEANE: So then shall we
10 table this until next one and re-discuss this in
11 February?

12

13 MR. BRAUN: No, I can do that now.
14 I'm offering to do this now because I've reviewed
15 this so many times.

16

17 MR. RICHARDSON: Kevin, this is
18 Don Richardson. I think it was you who brought up
19 the fact there could be a stumbling block if the
20 percentages exceed, what did you say, four percent
21 or whatever the number was. What is the likelihood
22 of that and can't we just check those before we
23 send it out so we are in compliance with what that
24 one entity needs. Was it the town or the --

25

26 MS. DEONARINE: It was the county.
27 So in the draft I may have put on
28 the drop box, (inaudible).

29

30 MR. BRAUN: Yes, the budget
31 numbers, the percentage in that is changing as per

1

2 this IMA. So that's not even a discussion point.

3

CHAIR KEANE: Well, my discussion
4 point -- this is Bob Keane, was that when we
5 changed or increase the dues, the percentages and
6 the numbers were -- we have to --

7

MR. BRAUN: Right. But that's not
8 now. That's not now.

9

CHAIR KEANE: That was resolved.
10 That was resolved.

11

MR. BRAUN: That was not now.

12

CHAIR KEANE: Right. That was
13 one of the big sticking points. But we corrected
14 that.

15

MR. RICHARDSON: This is Don
16 Richardson. This looks good to go the way it's
17 been suggested here.

18

MS. DEONARINE: What way has been
19 suggested? Which way are we --

20

MR. RICHARDSON: Who requested --
21 Kevin? This is Don again.

22

Kevin, did you express the last
23 statement on the way it should be kept or it should
24 be expressed?

25

MR. BRAUN: Yeah, this is Kevin

1

2 from the Town of North Hempstead. I was going to
3 go through the minor edits that I thought were on
4 Sarah's list and maybe I can shed some light on and
5 then we can move forward. That's up to the
6 committee. I'm just offering my opinion.

7

MR. RICHARDSON: That sounds
8 good.

9

MR. BRAUN: Okay. Would you guys
10 mind if I went through this real quick?

11

MS. DEONARINE: Go ahead. Go
12 ahead, Kevin.

13

MR. BRAUN: And I apologize. I'm
14 just trying to make this move faster. I hope you
15 all understand I'm not trying to bulldoze this or
16 anything.

17

(Overlapping conversation.)

18

MALE VOICE: I agree with you
19 completely because you're the one who knows what
20 might create a problem and we don't want to do that
21 so that extent, I'd be very comfortable with what
22 you come up with.

23

MR. BRAUN: Okay. So I'm going to
24 go ahead. This is up to the committee, of course,
25 to discuss but do we mention a new water quality

1

2 improvement plan that's in progress? Sure. It
3 doesn't change anything in the IMA. Mention it.
4 That's fine.

5

6 Do we need to specify that there's
7 any subsequent IMA? Sure. You can say this goes
8 from the 2015 IMA and that's the most recent thing
9 that it's going to.

10

11 Should we, the committee, update
12 the goals of the committee? No. Look at the
13 committee goals that are in the IMA and they're the
14 same thing that we're always trying to do. We're
15 trying to improve water quality, improve the
16 wetlands and do good things for the community. So I
17 don't think they need to be approved as per this
18 IMA.

19

20 Line 152, the breakdown of the
21 villages. None -- none discussing issue. We
22 worked through this already. I'm not looking to
23 change it.

24

25 Charity giving. Line 188 to 191.
26 Now I looked at this and the reason why this is in
27 there is because there is a -- there is a charity
28 or a -- a fund available at the town that somebody
29 or some groups can donate money to. It hasn't been

1

2 used much. It came about when Fred Pollock was a
3 councilmember for the committee --

4

MS. DEONARINE: That's not
5 charity. It's clarity. The language about the
6 executive director position.

7

MR. BRAUN: Okay. Hold on. I
8 have the IMA. I'm looking at it right now. I'm
9 sorry. I thought it was charity.

10

MS. DEONARINE: No. And let me
11 share that.

12

MALE VOICE: While you're looking,
13 did you mention the proxy votes or absentee votes?
14 Did I miss that?

15

MS. DEONARINE: We had talked
16 about that and I think it was -- we figured out
17 that it wasn't allowed.

18

MALE VOICE: Okay.

19

MS. DEONARINE: You have to be
20 here in person or have a designated second who's
21 here. Like Nora has Mike Malloy as her second.

22

MALE VOICE: Well, I suspect that
23 as COVID, you know, recedes, there's going to be a
24 point where things open up and yet certain
25 individuals are not going to still be comfortable

1

2 meeting in public. So at some point we will likely
3 have to consider, at least be open to hybrid
4 meetings.

5

6 MR. BRAUN: It's an executive
7 order.

8

9 CHAIR KEANE: Yeah. I was just
10 going to say that.

11

12 MALE VOICE: (inaudible) we can go
13 back. We still may not have --

14

15 MR. BRAUN: Yeah, Paul, but we
16 don't have -- I'm sorry. Mike, we don't get to
17 make the determination, the State does. So the
18 State Open Meeting Laws dictate that we need to
19 have meetings in person with the exception of the
20 Executive Order that was passed because of COVID.

21

22 So we're going to have to go back
23 when -- when this is over, hopefully soon, to
24 public meetings. So that's not really up to us to
25 discuss.

26

27 MR. ERTEL: Okay.

28

29 Thank you.

30

31 CHAIR KEANE: Okay. Back to line

32

33 88.

34

35 MR. BRAUN: Yeah, I'm sorry. I

1

2 don't see the issue with this.

3

4 Sarah, maybe you can enlighten me
5 more. I'm reading it and I don't see the --

6

7 MS. DEONARINE: So I originally
8 said that the chairperson, which is Bob, called the
9 meeting but it's really -- it's me that's been
10 calling the meetings though. We vote on a meeting
11 date, or the whole committee actually.

12

13 MR. BRAUN: Sarah, it's really
14 Bob's call but he's just letting you basically do
15 the work as Executive Director. Yet the authority
16 still lies with Bob or the chairperson to call the
17 meetings and everything. But he just delegates
18 that to you. So that's not an issue.

19

20 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. The rest of
21 the line reads, this is written in blue and
22 underlined. Each committee member has an equal
23 vote in deciding the business of the committee.
24 And a vote can only take place if we have a quorum.
25 It's not said anywhere else in the IMA so I thought
26 that we might need to add that in.

27

28 But as you pointed out earlier,
29 we've never had any kind of issue in the past.

30

31 MR. BRAUN: And I don't see an

1

2 issue there. I think it's fine the way it is.

3

MS. DEONARINE: But if I'm adding
4 that in, will that add more issue for getting it
5 past lawyers?

6

MR. BRAUN: Yes.

7

MS. DEONARINE: So I'll remove
8 that.

9

Okay. So I'm continuing on.

10

MR. BRAUN: Okay.

11

CHAIR KEANE: Do you want to go
12 back to your comment page?

13

MS. DEONARINE: Yes. Can you see
14 it now? Okay.

15

CHAIR KEANE: Now I can.

16

MR. BRAUN: I'm sorry. I was on
17 mute as that was going on. Sorry for that.

18

The line item 208, 209, are we
19 okay with that? Paragraph 13 and 21 as it's
20 described, we're okay. We can move past that?

21

MS. DEONARINE: Yes.

22

CHAIR KEANE: I think so.

23

MS. DEONARINE: Yep.

24

MR. BRAUN: (Inaudible) is
25 acceptable. I guess. I don't know that's a more

1

2 procedural thing, not an IMA thing. I don't know
3 who's okay with that or whatever during COVID but I
4 really don't have an answer for that one. I'm fine
5 with it. I don't know if the attorneys for the
6 villages and towns and everything are fine with it.

7 I still have to have contracts
8 signed by my supervisor. So I don't know if that's
9 allowable. You have to play that based on
10 villages, I guess and the towns.

11 MR. ERTEL: So this is Mike Ertel,
12 Sands Point.

13 In my experience, electronic
14 signatures are generally accepted almost everywhere
15 without, you know, the time that it's allowable or
16 not. I think it's commonplace in huge,
17 multi-million dollar deals without any agreement.
18 So I don't think it's an issue. I think we could
19 just have electronic signatures.

20 CHAIR KEANE: This is Bob Keane.
21 But does that need to be added into the IMA do you
22 feel or do you feel like omitting it, it still
23 allows us to do the electronic signatures without
24 changes to the IMA.

25 MR. ERTEL: You're making me

1

2 insecure about asking to make a statement. But
3 putting that insecurity aside, I'm comfortable
4 without specifically stating it but I think
5 electronic signatures should be fine.

6

CHAIR KEANE: Thank you.

7

8 MR. ERTEL: Then we're going to
9 just going to act under those electronic
10 signatures. No one's going to question this.
11 There's never going to be an issue about it.

12

CHAIR KEANE: Thank you.

13

This is Bob Keane again.

14

15 So that was my point, is do we
16 even need to have it in there. If we don't really
17 need to have it in there, we can still do the
18 electronic signature without having to modify the
19 IMA. That would keep the IMA the same and then
20 that stops us from having the lawyers now question
21 electronic signatures.

22

MR. BRAUN: Yes. This is Kevin

23

24 from the Town of North Hempstead.

25

26 That's more a procedural issue and
27 not an IMA issue. Whether it's accepted it doesn't
28 include it in the IMA. That's -- that's a
29 procedural after the fact and I agree with Mike.

Once again, there's going to be a record but I do think it's not necessarily you need to put it in the IMA.

CHAIR KEANE: Good.

MR. BRAUN: I will say, I think you need a haircut but that's it.

3 him another copy with changes?

MR. BRAUN: Not unless they ask.

MR. BRAUN: I wouldn't change -- I
7 would send them the document as changed and I would
8 look at it. And if the attorney is of any worth,
9 they'll look it at it and compare it themselves. I
10 don't -- I don't -- unless they ask for it, I mean,
11 I'm not an attorney but I know how to avoid one if
12 needed. So I wouldn't do anything like that.

13

And that's with all respect to the
14 attorneys in the Zoom meeting.

15

So I was ready to track changes but for any of the people that think we might need them, I do note permanent modifications or renewals all the time so that the State regulators can just easily see what I'm changing.

4 I'd like to thank Bob (inaudible),
5 especially Dan that shows his people and tell that
6 it's substantially the same. And they're going to
7 say well, how? And what was changed? And they're
8 going to want to know. So it seems we're not
9 changing anything substantive really and they're
10 very minor changes. And I think it's
11 inconsequential to have the red line. In fact, it
12 will potentially help because it will show that
13 there really aren't, you know --

14

15 MR. FUCCI: I'm just thinking
16 getting the attorneys and the county on board now
17 and not have any surprises later.

18

19 MS. DEONARINE: I (inaudible) a
20 version for us and then a non-track change version
21 that was sent out. Dan, you'll have both.

22

23 MR. FUCCI: Right. This is Dan.
24 You'll send out the track changes shortly?

25

26 MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.

28 MR. FUCCI: Okay. Because I would
29 like to have at least a verbal from the attorney
30 that it's fine, don't worry about it.

4 The (inaudible) I'm known for this
5 thing so I'm just wondering if you're looking to
6 preempt it or --

8 it won't be the last. I just want to make sure
9 when we are the last it's not three years later.

10 MR. BRAUN: So the county --

11 MR. FUCCI: We're not -- I'm just
12 asking the County Attorney to look at this and say,
13 okay, it'll be fine. And let the process work and
14 whether we get it, you know, they're not going to
15 make any changes.

15

16 MR. BRAUN: But to me, we are just
17 changing a simple small thing that we discussed;
18 right? Changing the IMA and changing the water
19 quality, just nothing structurally, nothing --
20 that's what I'm trying to make sure everybody's
21 aware of when they go back to their representative
22 that nothing here is changing but minor stuff.

22

23 CHAIR KEANE: I agree.

23

24 So enough discussion then so --

25 MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.

25

CHAIR KEANE: -- moving on to

1

2 updates.

MS. DEONARINE: Okay. I actually
4 want to do updates out of order. Can I talk then.

CHAIR KEANE: You can do whatever
6 you like.

8 there were two report updates that I forgot about.

So we've got State money from the
10 Department of Environmental Conservation, DEC to do
11 water quality monitoring and action.

12

So that grant has been extended
13 until the end of this year. And we're like the last
14 holdout because we do not have a State approved
15 quality assurance project plan. And we also need
16 (inaudible) ability before we move onto the
17 (inaudible) with the work we've already done.

18

So there's a water quality
19 subcommittee of this group, which is bob, Kevin,
20 Jennifer Wilson Pines and myself. And so we just
21 reviewed a draft that we got from my consultant,
22 Dvirka and Bartiluci and we sent comment back to
23 them and I haven't received any -- an updated plan.

24

They also haven't sent us yet a
25 data usability agreement to review. Supposedly I

1

2 reached out to them today and she said we'd have
3 one by the end of the week. So we'll see.

4

I had a question to the committee,
5 does the committee have to review and approve the
6 QAPP or so long as the EPA accepts it, we're fine
7 with that.

8

MR. BRAUN: So this is Kevin
9 Braun, Town of North Hempstead.

10

The subcommittee would provide the
11 committee -- the committee with any comments with
12 their approval and the committee would go ahead and
13 then approve it.

14

In other words, the subcommittee
15 is presenting it to the committee saying, it's
16 good. It's ready to go and then the committee would
17 have a vote on it.

18

MS. DEONARINE: Well, the committee
19 does have to vote on it before it goes to DEC or --

MR. BRAUN: I think procedurally
21 you have to accept the document. So, yes.

So our annual reporting for the permit for the MS4 the storm sewer system or just the -- the reporting year ends March 9th so (inaudible) but just check and tell you really just

1

2 to check and really just to check and make sure
3 that they've done what they said they were going to
4 do in last year's report.

5 LIQWIDS made -- the committee
6 actually did submit a letter. The LIQWIDS is, the
7 biggest EPA's data storage system and it is
8 difficult to use, though it's part of the Long
9 Island National Action Plan, they'll move it from
10 DEC and have all the water quality monitoring
11 groups upload their data into LIQWID. But it's --
12 I guess the reports very difficult. So we signed
13 on to a letter with the other protection
14 committees, the Hempstead Harbor Protection
15 Committee, asking that funding be set aside to
16 train us in how to do that.

17 But at the last Citizens Advisory
18 Committee meeting for Long Island (inaudible), they
19 said that actually using LIQWIDS is off the table.
20 And they're going to try and find a new -- a new
21 data entry portal that's part of Microsoft Excel.
22 So I guess our letter worked.

23 And we already talked about the
24 water quality monitoring. I'm working on a winter
25 newsletter. So expect to see a draft of then.

And then, also, I wanted to do just a quick update on the Long Island Sound Study Citizens Advisory Committee. We had a meeting in December, the Manhasset Bay Protection Committee is a voting member on the CAC, is what they call it.

We also serve on their policy subcommittee and on the watershed group. The focus of the meeting was on environmental justice issue, which is the fair and equal treatment of all people and the environment. And so Manhasset Bay Watershed only has one identified environmental justice community so I'm not really sure it's something we need to pay close attention to but I just wanted to let you know that the Long Island Sound Study is trying to focus on getting to underrepresented groups and getting them involved.

We talked about updates to the Comprehensive Conservation Management Plan, not only updates to what we're going to focus on and that included the environmental justice issues.

Some of the more important things that (inaudible) was that the water -- there is a Water Resources Development Act, which directs the Army Corps of Engineers and the work they do was

1

2 approved and expanded. The Army Corps now has to
3 include equity requirement. They have to
4 prioritize green technology before gray
5 technologies and they have to sea level rise not
6 just flooding.

7 So with the new president and the
8 new administration there's a possibility that the
9 Army Corps could go back to discussing (inaudible)
10 around New York City but with these new expanded
11 mandates it will keep us protected, there's a lot
12 of -- putting in those storm barriers would have
13 major consequences for us. So that will be an
14 issue because this new expanded act just passed.

15 And also, Plum Island is all the
16 way out at the end. It's the animal research
17 laboratory that's being closed down. There had
18 been a mandate that Plum Island had to be sold in
19 order to off put the federal cost of building a new
20 animal disease laboratory. I think what that is,
21 I'm not sure, I guess there was an act that passed.
22 So Plum Island is no longer required to be sold.

23 So it's important area for shore
24 birds and other natural resources. It's not
25 developed. So it's actually -- it's really good.

And then there's a new work reform called the Sustainable and Resilient Communities and I'm hoping they'll be some good information for us.

So those are the updates from the CAC. Those are all my updates.

8 with the Town of North Hempstead.

It's a county pond. Did you talk
10 to the county?

9 trying to get our facility designated as a dredge
10 processing facility.

Anybody else?

MR. FUCCI: Yeah, Sarah, this is

18

Dan Fucci.

Sarah, if you could just do me a

favor and when you send out the e-mail to me

21

relative to the signature, the IMA, reference the

22

State law that requires us to do this because the

23

attorneys are going to ask me why we're doing this.

24

So I have to be able to answer that question.

Another point to that e-mail is, I

1

2 think, you can discuss the chronology of what
3 happened and I think, Dan, correct me if I'm wrong,
4 but I think your requirement is that you have to
5 some percentage of the number of people signed on
