- 7 MR. BRAUN: Bob, could I request
- 8 you never do that again?
- 9 CHAIRMAN KEANE: That was Kevin
- 10 and he didn't like me waving my arms up and down to
- 11 cheer for Samantha, our intern. Just to be

- 13 MS. DEONARINE: All right. Well,
- 14 so thank you-all for coming. This is the Manhasset
- 15 Bay Protection Committee meeting of April 15, 2021.
- 16 And I would like to add two things
- 17 to the agenda. One to discuss the Quality
- 18 Assurance Project Plan we're working on for our
- 19 water quality monitoring and getting that approved
- 20 by the State DEC. And then also talking about the
- 21 infrastructure bill that is going to be going
- 22 through Congress this year.
- 23 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Okay. And I
- 24 guess as a point of order, just the agenda has got
- 25 the wrong date on it.

2	MS.	DEONARINE:	Yes.	I've

- 3 changed that in the notes.
- 4 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Okay. So I
- 5 guess the first thing we'll do is we need to make a
- 6 motion to approve the meeting minutes transcription
- 7 by MGR, reporting at a cost of no more than \$4.45
- 8 per page and not exceed 600. Does somebody want to
- 9 make that motion?
- 10 MS. MONOSON: I'll make the
- 11 motion. This is Jill Monoson from Thomaston making
- 12 the motion.
- 13 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Got a second?
- MR. ERTEL: Mike Ertel, Sands
- 15 Point. I second.
- 16 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Okay. All those
- 17 in favor?
- 18 (Chorus of "ayes.")
- 19 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Opposed?
- 20 (No response.)
- 21 CHAIRMAN KEANE: I'm seeing none.
- 22 And that motion carries. Thank you. And then we
- 23 need a motion for somebody to adopt the minutes
- 24 from the February 25th. I don't know if
- 25 everybody's had a chance to look at those. You

- 4 motion, Bob. Nora Haagenson from Baxter Estates.
- 5 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Do I have a
- 6 second?
- 7 MR. ERTEL: Mike Ertel, Sands

- 9 CHAIRMAN KEANE: All those in
- 10 favor?
- 11 (Chorus of "ayes.")
- 12 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Opposed?
- 13 (No response.)
- 14 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Abstain?
- 15 (No response.)
- 16 CHAIRMAN KEANE: That motion
- 17 carries too then. Thank you.
- 18 Moving right along. The next item
- 19 on the agenda. Formation of Dues Structure
- 20 subcommittee. I guess, we'll preface that with --
- 21 I had an interesting call with the Mayor of --
- MS. DEONARINE: Kensington.
- 23 CHAIRMAN KEANE: -- Kensington,
- 24 thank you. I think she was a little upset with the
- 25 dues structure and thinking that we'd all, like,

- 3 she had asked Sarah to do some research or bring it
- 4 up and try to see if there could be some sort of
- 5 sliding dues scale.
- I basically talked to her for I
- 7 don't remember, half-an-hour or an hour and kept
- 8 trying to plead the fact that I am a volunteer, our
- 9 group are made of volunteers, our appointed
- 10 trustees were all volunteers, you know, like we've
- 11 talked about the -- I told her that we had talked
- 12 about upping the dues ad nauseam and the
- 13 implications that would be affecting those, only a
- 14 nominal fee of, I think \$300 per village.
- 15 I actually put together a
- 16 spreadsheet with respect to the size of the village
- 17 by area and population and showing her that she is
- 18 not the smallest by either land mass or by -- and
- 19 there is a disparaging, you know, difference
- 20 between some of the villages have a greater land
- 21 mass or population. But trying to tell her to come
- 22 up with some sort of fair system is kind of hard
- 23 with respect that, okay, so these four villages
- 24 will pay 1,500 and these, you know, ten villages
- 25 will pay 2,000. Like, I think it's like, it's a

- 2 lot of discussion and a lot of, you know, we've
- 3 kind of gotten over that ad nauseam.
- 4 She was kind of hinting at a
- 5 subcommittee be formed or we discuss it formally or
- 6 -- I wanted to at least bring it to the attention
- 7 to the board. I know Sarah, I know you reached out
- 8 to her to basically, I guess, send, like, an
- 9 apology and say I'm sorry, I didn't, you know,
- 10 think of you or I sent you the minutes, but I guess
- I should've note -- told you when we were
- 12 discussing the IMA dues structure.
- 13 So that's kind of where that
- 14 stands. So I'm kind of just leave it up for
- 15 discussion if anybody has anything to add about, if
- 16 they feel that that's necessary or if any of the
- 17 smaller villages feel that there -- and I told her,
- 18 you know what we --
- 19 MS. MONOSON: This is Jill
- 20 Monoson. I'm the Village of Thomaston, which I
- 21 believe is smaller than the Village of Kensington
- 22 land mass wise. But was someone from the Village
- 23 of Kensington on all of our calls when we were
- 24 talking about the dues?
- 25 CHAIRMAN KEANE: I think that was

- 2 Rebecca and I think she was -- I don't remember if
- 3 she was or she wasn't. I'd have to go back and
- 4 look at the --
- 5 MS. DEONARINE: I think it was
- 6 both. She was there for one but not for another
- 7 discussion.
- 8 MS. MONOSON: Okay. Because I
- 9 know that you're correct, Bob, we talked about it a
- 10 lot.
- 11 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Yeah. To the
- 12 point where like, okay, if we were in the building,
- 13 we would have had to leave because they're not
- 14 going to pay overtime.
- 15 MS. SHEEHAN: So this is Dianne
- 16 Sheehan from the Village of Plandome Heights. And
- 17 I think it was because of a letter that our Mayor
- 18 wrote to you, Sarah.
- 19 MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
- 20 MS. SHEEHAN: Which initiated the
- 21 entire conversation two years ago, that we felt
- 22 that the structure of the payment was unfair. But
- 23 we have -- we still feel that way, but we're going
- 24 to pay them, we're not going to talk about it
- 25 anymore.

2	CHAIRMAN KEANE: I also told her
3	this is Bob Keane again. I also told her, you
4	know, with respect to the budget and we're not just
5	willy-nilly throwing things out there and our
6	budget allows for a certain dollar amount and we
7	basically spend half of that, we're very cognizant
8	of our costs for everything that comes through,
9	comes through a vote and basically representatives
10	from every municipality is on these calls to
11	discuss our expenditures and, you know, and
12	Sarah's, I think she's got a lot and double her
13	salary and we don't really get to that level. So
14	it's not like we're just billing them like crazy
15	and having to raise our dues because we're doing
16	things outside
17	MR. BRAUN: Bob, Bob, hang on.
18	I'm just going to interject here because I think
19	you're trying to clear the apologies or trying to
20	just appease some people. I'm going to say that
21	the dues structure, this same discussion happened
22	and I reach back to my archives and talk to people
23	who have were there at the original point of it.
24	All these things came up. All these things with we
25	discussed, land mass, population, and because there

- 2 was no real determining factor on where you were
- 3 going to draw the line on dues, whether it's
- 4 population, land mass, all that, it was -- I don't
- 5 want to say litigated, but it was discussed early
- 6 and came to a conclusion that this was the best
- 7 possible situation.
- 8 And if -- and I'm going to say
- 9 this as a Zoom, political as I can. Maybe we don't
- 10 appease or maybe we do not continue to discuss one
- 11 village's issue longer than we have for the last
- 12 couple of years. We always allow the villages to
- 13 pull out as part of their IMA. Every year they had
- 14 the ability to say, I don't want to be a part of
- 15 this. And if they do, they lose their Phase 2
- 16 contribution that comes from the committee.
- 17 And if I recall, once again,
- 18 Kensington was fined by, I'm not sure if it's the
- 19 EPA or the DEC at that point for not following
- 20 through on the Phase 2 Stonewater requirements.
- So once again, I'm just going to
- 22 say that everybody on this committee, the villages
- 23 and everybody associated is willing or is able to
- 24 pull out of the committee if they don't agree with
- 25 the due structure. I've talked to Sarah about

- 2 this. I've talked to you and I think it's at the
- 3 point of nauseam. So I'm just going to suggest
- 4 that we have heard the concerns. And, I mean, if
- 5 this is not the committee sentiment, then by all
- 6 means we can discuss it further, but we have gone
- 7 through this awhile. And I am of the opinion that
- 8 we need to stop beating this dead horse.
- 9 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Kevin, that's --
- MR. BRAUN: Kevin Braun,
- 11 Hempstead.
- 12 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Kevin, thank
- 13 you. And at the end of the conversation, I
- 14 basically told her that exact same sentiment. I
- 15 said, look, if you don't feel that this, you know,
- 16 expenditure is worthwhile, then you can easily pull
- 17 out. But I was trying to explain to her that the
- 18 legal fees that involved just with trying to make a
- 19 minor change through the IMA would have to go back
- 20 to, you know, the attorneys and this and that and
- 21 that Nassau County and so forth. And I said, The
- 22 normal dollar amount that we're really talking
- 23 about, I said, and to come up with something fair,
- 24 it's, you know -- I said I'll bring it up before
- 25 the board, which is why it's on the minutes. They

- 2 can at least commemorate the fact that we have
- 3 talked about it.
- I have the same feeling that you
- 5 do, that we've talked about it and talked about it
- 6 but I don't want to short-sell the smaller villages
- 7 if they have a platform, or they wanted something
- 8 and if they felt like something had to go further,
- 9 then, you know, I would entertain that as making a
- 10 subcommittee to further explore it. But I'm under
- 11 the same opinion that you are.
- 12 MS. SHEEHAN: So am I. And that's
- 13 Dianne Sheehan. I am of the same opinion.
- MR. ERTEL: This is Mike Ertel,
- 15 Village of Sands Point.
- 16 CHAIRMAN KEANE: What village are
- 17 you from, Dianne, again?
- MS. SHEEHAN: Say again, Bob?
- 19 CHAIRMAN KEANE: What village are
- 20 you, just for the record?
- 21 MS. SHEEHAN: Plandome Heights.
- 22 Because we spoke about this in great depth two
- 23 years ago. And you gave a valid answer and we were
- 24 content with that answer. And we decided that we
- 25 would not bring it up anymore. And that's the

- 2 answer that Kevin just brought up.
- 3 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Okay. And Jill
- 4 --
- 5 MR. ERTEL: Mike -- go ahead.
- 6 CHAIRMAN KEANE: -- and I was
- 7 just going to say, Jill, I don't know if you had
- 8 any comments either. I know Thomaston is a small
- 9 village as well.
- 10 MS. MONOSON: It is. But, like,
- 11 when we discussed this last year, I think it's very
- 12 difficult to come up with a very equitable way to
- 13 do it. And it's not -- the increase wasn't so
- 14 exorbitant that I felt like you, it wasn't worth
- 15 the time and the effort. You know, while I agree
- 16 that maybe some villages are getting -- it's not
- 17 that they're getting better benefits, it's just
- 18 that they have a larger land mass. I didn't think
- 19 it was worth the argument and our mayor said it was
- 20 fine --
- 21 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Okay. And I
- 22 spoke to my mayor just -- and I'm in the middle in
- 23 Port Washington North. And our mayor was like,
- 24 I'll gladly pay that because the benefits that it
- 25 gives us with respect to the MS for reporting, you

- 2 know, we pay our consultant and this does a lot of
- 3 the things for Section 1 and Section 2, so --
- 4 MS. MONOSON: Right.
- 5 CHAIRMAN KEANE: -- to him \$300
- 6 -- and again, we're not a huge village either, and
- 7 he was perfectly happy with that.
- 8 MS. MONOSON: Right.
- 9 MR. BRAUN: Bob, I think Mike had
- 10 something to say.
- 11 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Yeah. I'm
- 12 sorry, Mike. I cut you off.
- 13 MR. ERTEL: Not at all. Mike
- 14 Ertel, Village of Sands Point. I agree with Kevin.
- 15 I guess it must be the Zoom thing. But one other
- 16 -- maybe this is a follow-up. Bob, in the future,
- 17 you know, we have talked about this and we really
- 18 have tried, I think, at least at the meetings I was
- 19 at, to come up with something equitable. You know,
- 20 and we thought it was equitable.
- 21 If a village is displeased with
- 22 it, then perhaps we should put the burden on them
- 23 to suggest a more equitable solution that we can
- 24 then consider as opposed to offering for us to come
- 25 up with the solution. Because it seems like we've

- 2 tried that and it was just, you know, too difficult
- 3 for us to do or we weren't able to talk to any sort
- 4 of, not even a consensus, but even any ideas.
- 5 CHAIRMAN KEANE: This is Bob
- 6 Keane again. And I think at the end of the
- 7 conversation she understood the problems that we
- 8 had trying to make an equitable and trying to make
- 9 it fair and for the nominal sliding scale. And
- 10 eventually she just said that's fine, I guess I'll
- 11 just going to stop it right here.
- 12 I think she was more upset with
- 13 the fact that she wasn't invited to the table or
- 14 something or she wanted to basically just make her
- 15 point across. And I told her that she has her
- 16 representatives who can easily report back if she
- 17 didn't read the minutes and some other things. But
- 18 at the end of she kind of left it. But again, I
- 19 told her that I would task the group with -- and if
- 20 they felt the subcommittee was necessary. I feel
- 21 like the consensus right now is that a subcommittee
- 22 is not necessary. I've heard from a couple of
- 23 smaller villages that they felt that they, you
- 24 know, they'll deal with it and the cost is not
- 25 exorbitant and move on. So basically, I quess

- 2 we'll sort of end this conversation. But I think
- 3 the consensus is that the subcommittee is not
- 4 needed and the other villages feel that we're fair.
- 5 MR. BRAUN: I'd like to make a
- 6 motion not to address the subject until next year.
- 7 MS. SHEEHAN: I'll second that.
- 8 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Okay. Seconded
- 9 by?
- 10 MR. ERTEL: I'll triple that.
- 11 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Seconded by
- 12 Dianne. Okay. All those in favor?
- 13 (Chorus of "ayes.")
- 14 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Oppose?
- 15 (No response.)
- 16 CHAIRMAN KEANE: None. Then that
- 17 motion will carry.
- MR. BRAUN: Great. Now let's get
- 19 to the business.
- 20 MS. DEONARINE: Wait. I have a
- 21 question. Should we send a letter to that effect
- 22 to perhaps both the Mayor of Kensington and the
- 23 Mayor of Plandome Heights?
- 24 CHAIRMAN KEANE: I don't think a
- 25 letter would necessarily be totally warranted. If

- 2 you want to send her an e-mail and just say we
- 3 brought it up at the meeting, your representative
- 4 was not there. The villages basically said that
- 5 it's -- we've done this and for members, older
- 6 members from the past, remember that there was no
- 7 real fair way to do it. You know, something short
- 8 and sweet. I can take a look at it too if you
- 9 want.
- 10 MR. RICHARDSON: If there isn't a
- 11 letter addressed to the committee, I don't think
- were obligated to send a letter back.
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay. Well, we
- 14 have received letters from the Mayor of Plandome
- 15 Heights. I can't remember.
- 16 MS. SHEEHAN: Was it addressed to
- 17 the whole committee or was it addressed to you?
- 18 MS. DEONARINE: It might have
- 19 been addressed to me.
- 20 MS. SHEEHAN: I think it was
- 21 Sarah, it's Dianne. I think it was addressed to
- 22 you.
- MR. RICHARDSON: Okay.
- 24 CHAIRMAN KEANE: That was a
- 25 recent letter?

3	MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. December
4	7th of 2020 and it was addressed to me.
5	MS. SHEEHAN: Okay.
6	MS. DEONARINE: From Mayor Ken
7	MS. SHEEHAN: Riscica.
8	MS. DEONARINE: Riscica.
9	CHAIRMAN KEANE: All right.
10	MR. BRAUN: But let me, Dianne,
11	if I may
12	CHAIRMAN KEANE: Sure.
13	MR. BRAUN: you did state that
14	you were your board is understanding, may not
15	agree, but its understanding, willing to pay the
16	dues?
17	MS. SHEEHAN: Absolutely. Kevin.
18	MR. BRAUN: Correct?
19	MS. SHEEHAN: Absolutely.
20	MR. BRAUN: Okay. So Sarah, I
21	mean I'm sorry. I'm speaking out of turn, but if
22	there is a letter that needs to be sent, it's not

to Plandome Heights. It is maybe to Kensington.

And that's just to say we considered and talked

about the discussion. We were going to keep the

- 9 MR. BRAUN: -- and Village
- 10 [inaudible].
- 11 MS. SHEEHAN: Yes. Kevin, I
- 12 agree with that.
- 13 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Kevin, this is
- 14 Bob Keane again. And I think if we send her the
- 15 minutes, you know, and --
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- 17 CHAIRMAN KEANE: -- that should
- 18 speak for itself. And if she wants to further any
- 19 conversations, you can contact us at her leisure.
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- 21 CHAIRMAN KEANE: So we can stop
- 22 stressing about Kensington. All right. Moving
- 23 alone. Sarah, you want to take No. 4?
- 24 MS. DEONARINE: Yes. So this
- 25 event was actually supposed to take -- have taken

3	summer because of COVID. So it's being the main
4	people putting it on are North Shore Land Alliance
5	and TNC. And I can read this quote, she sent me.
6	"The objective of Vendor Day is
7	to provide technical professionals with the
8	opportunity to gain experience in the innovative
9	and advanced technologies for on-site wastewater
LO	treatment systems. Interested parties, including
L1	design professionals, building inspectors, local
L2	government officials, environmental groups,
L3	homeowners, and small business owners, will have an
L 4	opportunity to learn about the IA technology from
L5	IA Septic Distributors on Long Island."
L6	So it's kind of like an
L7	environmental fair, but specific to the on-site
L8	wastewater treatment systems. The other protection
L9	committees, it sounds like they are also sponsoring
20	it. I don't think anything is required other than
21	showing up and having a table like we do at other
22	environmental fairs. But I thought I should
23	probably bring it to the committee before agreeing
24	to putting our name on it.

CHAIRMAN KEANE: Any comments or

- 2 -- this is Bob Keane. Any comments or --
- 3 MS. MONOSON: Sarah, this is Jill
- 4 Monoson, Thomaston. Sarah, you said it should have
- 5 happened already but because of COVID, it hasn't.
- 6 Is there a proposed new date?
- 7 MS. DEONARINE: No. She said
- 8 July.
- 9 MS. MONOSON: Okay.
- MS. DEONARINE: But no specific
- 11 date.
- 12 MR. BRAUN: Sarah, this is Kevin

7	MS. DEONARINE: Well, that was my
8	understanding. They just want to use our name.
9	MS. MONOSON: For credibility?
10	MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.
11	CHAIRMAN KEANE: I guess
12	MS. SHEEHAN: I guess we are so
13	credible.
14	MS. MONOSON: Well, this is Jill
15	from Thomaston, I mean, from a marketing
16	perspective, putting a non-profit on the thing
17	certainly will help their marketing.

- CHAIRMAN KEANE: This is Bob 18
- 19 Do we know anything about this IA
- 20 technology septic system? And are there going to
- 21 be other vendors at this event?
- 22 MS. DEONARINE: Yes. So it will
- 23 be multiple vendors at the event. It's meant, I
- 24 guess, to educate the locals about innovative and
- 25 advanced technology, since that's what Nassau

- 2 County is trying to move into. Suffolk County has
- 3 already approved some systems. And there are
- 4 different distributors who Suffolk County has

3	Keane and I kind of I hear what you're saying,
4	Don, for the technical whatever, but I think
5	there's always going to be ancillary groups there
6	promoting either environmental things. And I think
7	we've been involved with the cesspool program and
8	pilot program. And if we're there to provide any
9	additional information about how these systems can
10	improve the quality of the water, design
11	professionals might not be there, but the other
12	groups such as homeowners or environmental groups
13	or government officials can sort of learn about the
14	effects of these systems on our Bay. So I think
15	it's a good thing.
16	MR. RICHARDSON: I would hope
17	there'd be vendors there directly supporting that
18	with pamphlets and so forth. We wouldn't be in a
19	position to do that. And someone explaining it and
20	supporting it really have to know a lot about it in
21	order to answer any questions.
22	CHAIRMAN KEANE: Well, I think
23	MR. RICHARDSON: Just for
24	thought, that's all.
25	CHAIRMAN KEANE: This is Bob

- 2 Keane again. And our group did go to a nature
- 3 preserve in -- what was that, Laurel Hollow a
- 4 couple of years back where we did see an
- 5 alternative septic system. They pumped it up as a
- 6 great thing and we got the, there was a couple of
- 7 weeds growing out of their flower beds, was still
- 8 under the [inaudible] spaces. But the point was
- 9 it's just a different technology that's supposed to
- 10 reduce contaminants from -- you know, so I think
- 11 it's still a good thing.

- 2 program. Dan, do you mind giving us an update on
- 3 the Nine Element Watershed Plan and the SEPTIC
- 4 program?
- 5 MR. FUCCI: Yeah. Again, the
- 6 SEPTIC program is looking to be rolled out on Earth
- 7 Day. This is unofficial so, you know, it's not for
- 8 public consumption yet. So there's supposed to be
- 9 a press conference and we're supposed to start
- 10 actually accepting applications, you know, once we
- 11 announced the program on Earth Day via through the
- 12 website. I believe there's already -- I mean,
- 13 there's an interest list that was already, you
- 14 know, interested in the program. I think there was
- 15 40-something people or homeowners that were
- 16 interested in the program. But they're going to
- 17 have to go through a rigorous application process.
- 18 And the Nassau County Soil and Water Conservation
- 19 District will collect those applications and assist
- 20 in approving those applications or walking the
- 21 residents through the process.
- So, you know, we are here with
- 23 that, it's exciting and, you know, we'll see how it
- 24 goes. So I look forward to this venture and
- 25 working together. So that's that. You're going to

25

2	hear more about this on Earth Day. So just stay
3	tuned. More information definitely to follow.
4	Relative to the Nine Element
5	program, SUNY Stony Brook created a couple of years
6	ago, a nitrogen loading model for Nassau County.
7	And now the Nine Element Program part of the
8	Nine Element Program that we're going through now
9	is to look at various scenarios, nitrogen reduction
10	scenarios that can be pumped into that model so we
11	can come up with various nitrogen reduction numbers
12	for various environmental improvement scenarios.
13	So right now excuse me we
14	sent out a e-mail blast to all the Nine Element
15	stakeholders in the group and we requested what
16	they would like to see, possibly with nitrogen
17	reduction in terms of the scenario and we received
18	comments back. So the County along with SUNY Stony
19	Brook and the DEC are now going over those
20	scenarios. And it looks like some of the major
21	components or the major scenarios will deal with
22	bio-extraction, looking at by valves and kelp and
23	seaweed and see how that can reduce nitrogen here
24	in Nassau County.

We're looking at fertilizer

- 2 reductions for residential landscapes. So we might
- 3 look at, well, what if there's a 25 percent
- 4 reduction in fertilizer, 50 percent, 75 percent.
- 5 What kind of numbers in terms of nitrogen reduction
- 6 as per this nitrogen loading model will we see?
- 7 There's also some discussion of looking at certain
- 8 parts of the County that are currently under
- 9 SEPTICs. Well, what if we took small areas and
- 10 connected them to the nearest wastewater treatment
- 11 facility? And I know Sarah, that was one of her
- 12 comments, for the Manhasset Bay Committees to look
- 13 at the Port Washington District and to see if there
- 14 are any areas that can be connected to the Port
- 15 Washington District based on whatever excess
- 16 capacity they may have at the current time.
- 17 On the south shore, they're
- 18 looking at Point Lookout, that's an area that's
- 19 currently under SEPTICs and what if we connect that
- 20 to the Bay Park to see the creek convenience work
- 21 that is currently underway to connect into that
- 22 sewage treatment facility. There's a small section
- 23 up in Bayville that I believe we're going to look
- 24 at. A commercial section in Bayville that may be
- 25 able to be connected over to The Birch's with some

2	οf	the	excess	capacity	there.

- 3 So in a nutshell, working to fix
- 4 some of the smaller areas that have been possibly
- 5 studied or being proposed and maybe run that
- 6 scenario through the model to see what kind of
- 7 reduction strategies you would get. And of course,
- 8 the alternative septic system program would be
- 9 another environmental nitrogen reducing technique
- 10 we would want to run through the model as well. So
- 11 we're fine-tuning this list and once we fine tune
- it, we'll get something out to the stakeholders.
- 13 And then of course then SUNY Stony Brook will start
- 14 literally running the model, running the scenarios
- through the model, and maybe in a few months we'll
- 16 have some good information. So that's pretty much
- 17 the update now with Nine Element.
- MS. DEONARINE: Thank you, Dan.
- 19 I did also want to point out that Manhasset Bay
- 20 Protection Committee is one of the stakeholders.
- 21 MR. FUCCI: That is correct.
- 22 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. Can we
- 23 move to discussion of the QAPP now and the
- 24 Infrastructure Bill?
- 25 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Sure.

2	MS. DEONARINE: All right. So
3	just as a reminder, the North Shore Protection
4	Committee's received a grant through the New York
5	State Department of Environmental Conservation to
6	support our water quality monitoring program. As
7	part of that, in order to expend funds, we have to
8	develop what's called a QAPP, a Quality Assurance
9	Project Plan.
10	So there is a sub-committee of
11	myself, Bob Keane, Kevin Braun, and Jennifer
12	Wilson-Pines and we've reviewed the QAPP. We sent
13	comment back to our consultant, Dvirka and
14	Bartilucci, and they've just sent us the QAPP with
15	the comments incorporated.
16	So the recommendation of the
17	sub-committee is to have them go ahead and support
18	and submit it to DEC for DEC approval. So the
19	question is, will the Committee take our word for
20	it and approve the QAPP going to DEC sight unseen?
21	MR. BRAUN: Let me give a little
22	clarification too, Sarah, because it sounded a
23	little weird when you said, Will you believe our
24	words and go ahead and do it sight unseen. The
25	QAPP is a Quality Assurance Project Plan. It's a

- 2 basic standard document that is required -- correct
- 3 me if I'm wrong at any time, Sarah. It's required
- 4 for -- I think it's the Marcellino money. Is that
- 5 it, or am I forgetting it?
- 6 MS. DEONARINE: No. That's
- 7 correct.
- 8 MR. BRAUN: Okay. So basically
- 9 it's a structured document that we had our
- 10 consultant prepare so we can get additional money.
- 11 The DEC then is going to review it again as a
- 12 regulatory agency for its technical merits. So we,
- 13 as a sub-committee, reviewed the documents. We
- 14 looked at them, we said it's okay.
- 15 So basically as a sub-committee,
- 16 we come to the regular committee and say, take our
- 17 recommendations and approve the document. If you
- 18 wanted to review it, you have the option to it, but
- 19 that's what the sub-committee swore to actually do
- 20 that work. So what Sarah, I think is trying to say
- 21 is, hey, we did the work. It looks good. There's
- 22 another regulatory agency ready to review it. We'd
- 23 like to do it at this meeting. We'd like to
- 24 approve the processing of this or providing it to
- 25 the DEC as a final product on our end. Does that

- 2 sound right?
- 3 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Bob. That
- 4 sounds right. And if anybody would like to read
- 5 it, it's definitely worth reading. It will put you
- 6 right to sleep right before bed.
- 7 MS. SHEEHAN: What?
- 8 CHAIRMAN KEANE: It's a standard
- 9 document used for -- basically just to kind of
- 10 describe how we're sampling. And so that -- if
- 11 somebody picks up the document, they'll know how to
- 12 sample. And it all has to do with the
- defensibility of the data and I think it was
- 14 required by the grant to have QAPP in place to make
- 15 sure that all of our people who were sampling --
- 16 and Samantha, if that's part of you the summer,
- 17 hopefully, that you'll know the procedures to
- 18 sample.
- 19 And then they're followed out from
- 20 one person to the next person so that anybody can
- 21 pick it up, read it, and figure it how to sample
- 22 and then sample the same -- so you get the same
- 23 results with your data. So that again, so all of
- 24 your data across a year, if we're doing 15 samples
- 25 per year, each set of samples should be sampled in

- 2 the same manner so that the data can be used to
- 3 kind of draw trends and things like that.
- 4 So again, it's a very technical
- 5 -- I mean, it's not that technical but sampling
- 6 isn't that crazy, but it is a technical document
- 7 that Kevin, Jennifer, Sarah, and myself have
- 8 reviewed. I feel that it's fine to go to the State
- 9 and if anybody would like to make a motion to
- 10 approve it or a discussion, that's where we are
- now.
- MR. BRAUN: Kevin from the Town
- of North Hempstead. If I'm able to, as a
- 14 sub-committee, say that I'd like to go ahead and
- 15 approve the document for processing to go to DEC.
- 16 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Okay. Do I have
- 17 a second? Looks like Jill's trying to second, but
- 18 I think she's muted.
- 19 MS. MONOSON: Second.
- 20 CHAIRMAN KEANE: You're still
- 21 muted.
- MS. MONOSON: You're right.
- MR. BRAUN: Jennifer, we --
- MS. MONOSON: Okay. That's fine.
- 25 CHAIRMAN KEANE: I think for the

- 2 record too though, just so the record shows that we
- 3 are being transcribed. Jennifer Wilson-Pines has
- 4 joined us from the Village of Manorhaven, and she
- 5 has seconded it. And do I have -- so all those in
- 6 favor?
- 7 (Chorus of "ayes.")
- 8 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Opposed?
- 9 (No response.)
- 10 CHAIRMAN KEANE: I see none.
- 11 Abstain?
- 12 CHAIRMAN KEANE: That motion
- 13 carries.
- 14 MR. BRAUN: And I too stand with
- 15 Seabirds.
- 16 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. The other
- item I wanted to add to the agenda there is, I
- 18 believe Congress has just started discussing it.
- 19 There is a massive Infrastructure bill. Some
- 20 people who follow the news better than me probably
- 21 know more about it than I do. Congress won't vote
- 22 on it until the summer, so the Protection
- 23 Committees are jumping on the possibility -- the
- 24 Protection Committees in Nassau County, Citizens
- 25 Campaign for the Environment, are jumping on the

- 2 opportunity just to present a large funding
- 3 opportunity.
- 4 And so we are coming up with a
- 5 wish list of projects. It's unlikely that we'll
- 6 get all the funding for it. We're not at all
- 7 married to the projects or have to, you know, we'll
- 8 have to go -- if we get the money, we could likely
- 9 use it for something other than the wish list. But
- 10 part of the idea is to highlight -- to come up with
- 11 a full wish list and highlight to Congress how
- 12 important water quality needs are when it comes to
- 13 infrastructure.
- 14 So I have already reached out --
- 15 a couple of things. One, I've gone through our past
- 16 water quality improvement plan and come up with a
- 17 list of projects from that. The other thing is
- 18 I've reached out to Manhasset, Lakeville and the
- 19 Port Washington Water Districts and the Great Neck
- 20 and Port Washington Water Pollution Control
- 21 districts and gotten their wish lists.
- The North Shore Protection
- 23 Committees are working with Congressman Suozzi's
- 24 office to create this list. So the e-mail from
- 25 Eric Swenson this week, he talked with Congressman

- 2 Suozzi's office again. And so they want us to
- 3 prioritize those lists. And we also want to ask
- 4 all the municipalities if they have any projects
- 5 that you want to add to the wish list, prioritized
- 6 list of projects to the wish list. So I'm going to
- 7 send out an e-mail to that effect shortly. We've
- 8 already talked to the Village of Baxter Estates and
- 9 gotten Shore Road projects on that list. Anybody
- 10 else has project ideas?
- 11 CHAIRMAN KEANE: This is Bob
- 12 Keane from Port Washington North. I thought
- 13 Congressman Suozzi was against the Infrastructure
- 14 bill if President Biden was not going to repeal the
- 15 salt tax.
- 16 MS. DEONARINE: That's the last
- 17 thing I heard in the news also, but according to
- 18 his office, they still want the list.
- 19 MS. SHEEHAN: Well, since Suozzi
- 20 just sent out a flyer calling it the Biden/Suozzi
- 21 plan, I think he's on board.
- 22 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Okay. So I
- 23 guess the suggestion is if you have ideas, send
- 24 them to Sarah.
- 25 MS. DEONARINE: Yeah.

5	MR. BRAUN: This is Kevin from
6	the Town of North Hempstead. I would like to maybe
7	re-brand that and not call it a wish list. I
8	understand this is just an informal Zoom meeting,
9	but on the actual list that I think went to Suozzi
10	that I reviewed from Eric, they called it a wish
11	list and I don't think that's the correct branding
12	for that. I would just ask to reconsider the
13	reconsider that wording or terminology.
14	MS. DEONARINE: Do you have any
15	suggestions?
16	MS. SHEEHAN: I would call
17	something like priority projects.
18	CHAIRMAN KEANE: Priority Water
19	Infrastructure Improvement Projects or something.
20	MS. SHEEHAN: Yeah.
21	MR. BRAUN: Yes, yes and yes.
22	MS. DEONARINE: Okay. What did
23	you just say? Priority water body improvement

- 2 improvement projects.
- 3 MS. SHEEHAN: Water quality
- 4 improvement projects.
- 5 MR. BRAUN: I just think wish
- 6 list sends the wrong message. Because these are
- 7 projects that all are going to improve water
- 8 quality. It is in our purview to do that. To call
- 9 it a wish list, I think it's too far-fetched.
- 10 That's all I'm saying.
- 11 MR. ERTEL: Mike Ertel, Village
- 12 of Sands Point. I agree with Kevin.
- 13 CHAIRMAN KEANE: And for the
- 14 fifth time today, I'm going to agree with Kevin.
- 15 This is Bob Keane.
- MR. BRAUN: I'm going to have to
- 17 leave this meeting now.
- 18 CHAIRMAN KEANE: All right. All
- 19 right. So moving along. Updates and municipal
- 20 updates.
- 21 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. I just
- 22 wanted to show you, I realized that we finished out
- 23 the first quarter of 2020. So I'm going to see if
- 24 I can share -- I don't share screen.
- 25 CHAIRMAN KEANE: On the bottom

- there's a button that says, share screen.
- 3 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. So this is
- 4 just a quick summary of our expenses and income.
- 5 Can you see it?
- 6 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Not yet. Now I
- 7 do.
- 8 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. So we've
- 9 received -- we've actually received more than this
- 10 \$1,800 so far. We've received from most
- 11 municipalities, including the Town of North
- 12 Hempstead, and all but the three villages have sent
- in their dues payments so far. So those will start
- 14 getting deposited and should all be deposited, I'm
- 15 hoping this month. But there's only \$1,800
- 16 deposited as of the end of March.
- 17 And then you can see our total
- 18 expenditures is the second from the bottom, it's
- 19 under \$3,000 but hopefully that number is going to
- 20 go up too with starting to see -- starting to pay
- 21 out bills through Water Quality and Improvement --
- 22 no, Water Quality Monitoring Program and then they
- 23 will eventually be reimbursed.
- 24 So some office supply is the
- 25 website's around \$72. The contractual services are

- 2 all the -- is the transcription cost which actually
- 3 is only for January. Our transcription is just a
- 4 little behind. Any questions about the dues or our
- 5 budget?
- MS. SHEEHAN: No.
- 7 CHAIRMAN KEANE: No.
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay. All right.
- 9 So that covers the first update. We already --
- 10 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Sarah, this is
- 11 Bob Keane. Just as the thing is being recorded, do
- 12 you have to submit a copy of that to the
- 13 transcriber to show what exhibit you were putting
- 14 up?
- 15 MS. DEONARINE: That's probably a
- 16 good point. Yes. I will send that.
- 17 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Call that
- 18 Exhibit A, was the budget.
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- 20 CHAIRMAN KEANE: I'm a lawyer on
- 21 TV.
- MS. WILSON-PINES: Members of the
- 23 jury, please disregard what he just said.
- 24 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. We talked
- 25 about the 2021 IMA. It seems like a lot of

- 2 municipalities have been approving it and I've been
- 3 getting a lot of e-mails because I asked for a lot
- 4 of signature pages. But other than what we talked
- 5 about already, that's going along fine.
- 6 The next item is that all of you
- 7 represent municipalities that fall under the MS4
- 8 permitting and therefore, your MS4 annual reports
- 9 are due June first --
- MS. SHEEHAN: Yes.
- 11 MS. DEONARINE: -- covering the
- 12 permit year and that starts March 10th of last year
- 13 and goes to March 9th of 2021. Last week, I sent
- 14 out Manhasset Bay Protection Committee's
- 15 information. So if you don't mind talking to the
- 16 village, whoever does your reporting and making
- 17 sure everybody got it, that would be great. I
- 18 haven't heard anything back so I'm assuming that's
- 19 a good thing. All right. Any questions on MS4
- 20 reporting?
- 21 MS. SHEEHAN: No, Sarah.
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay. So the
- 23 next is an update about Seabin. We have been --
- the vendor who sells Seabin Poralu Marine suggested
- 25 a floating system -- a self-floating system for

2	Seabin. As a reminder, that's the trash receptacle
3	that sits in the water and stuffs water into it,
4	trapping trash, and oil, and such. But the Harbor
5	Patrol doesn't think that that would work very
6	well. So that's why that's not on the discussion
7	to vote on.
8	However, in good news, the Seabin
9	is going to be attached to the kayak launch, which
10	is part of the Town Parks Department. And so I
11	reached out to them today and heard back that this
12	installation of the Seabin is now included in a
13	contract with Meyran Marine and that is on the
14	April 22nd town board agenda to be approved. And
15	once that's approved and the contract is signed,
16	the Seabin will be installed this year. That is
17	awesome news. And so I will I wrote in my
18	notes, Get the team back together. So I'll reach
19	out to the other entities we were working with to
20	start a volunteer monitoring hopefully this year.
21	We have to get this project actually up and
22	running.
23	Any questions about Seabin?

Okay. We already talked about

(No response.)

- what's happening with DEC Water Quality Monitoring.
- 3 That's the Marcellino grant and we're going to send
- 4 the QAPP, Quality Assurance Project Plan, to DEC.
- 5 And the subcommittee is reviewing and probably will
- 6 have to send back substantial comments on the data
- 7 usability assessment. But we'll bring that up at a
- 8 future date.
- 9 And then nothing is currently
- 10 happening with our Water Quality Improvement Plan,
- 11 which we had funded through the Department of
- 12 State. The Town of North Hempstead, put out the
- 13 RFP on our behalf to select a contractor to do that
- 14 work, to create the plan. Supposedly the RFP
- 15 closed, but I have not heard back from the town on
- 16 the responses. So I'll let you know. When we get
- 17 responses, the subcommittee will review them and --
- 18 along with the Town of North Hempstead and we'll
- 19 make a suggestion or recommendation to the
- 20 committee on --
- 21 MR. BRAUN: Sarah, just for
- 22 clarification. The committee will review and
- 23 decide who the contractor is. The town is just the
- 24 fiduciary or the procurement process. So I just
- 25 want to make sure you understand that the town

- 2 board does have to approve it but this committee,
- 3 the subcommittee gets to decide. Because as people
- 4 come and go, sometimes that is forgotten that the
- 5 committee makes the decision.
- 6 MS. DEONARINE: Yes. So yeah,
- 7 I'll still keep e-mail communication and let you
- 8 know if I hearing anything. Because our next
- 9 meeting is actually going to be a meeting with the
- 10 other joint protection committees on May 20th. And
- 11 we're probably going to be talking about
- 12 bio-extraction and Dan has also been invited to
- 13 talk about the Nine Element Plan again -- Nine

- 3 MS. HAAGENSON: Thank you.

- 20 MS. WILSON-PINES: -- and on the
- 21 ocean.
- 22 MR. BRAUN: -- loon -- I've never
- 23 heard a loon call on Manhasset Bay.
- 24 MS. WILSON-PINES: They don't
- 25 call because they're not breeding.

2 MR. BRAUN: Touche.

- 3 CHAIRMAN KEANE: There you go.
- 4 MS. WILSON-PINES: Okay. But
- 5 they are out there.
- 6 MR. BRAUN: You learn something
- 7 new everyday.
- 8 MS. WILSON-PINES: Yeah. No.
- 9 We're doing --
- 10 CHAIRMAN KEANE: She's like the
- 11 --
- MS. WILSON-PINES: -- I'm doing
- 13 -- well, not lobbying, advocacy with the Senators
- 14 and Congress people with Audubon on the
- 15 re-authorization of the Magnuson-Stevens Act.
- 16 CHAIRMAN KEANE: So Jennifer
- 17 Wilson-Pines was sort of like Jen Psaki on
- 18 Whitehouse, like schooling Fox right now. Thank
- 19 you for that update. It's definitely interesting
- 20 to know.
- 21 MR. BRAUN: Yeah. I don't know
- 22 anything about that, but I definitely got schooled.

- 3 the catch basin but leading into Baxter Pond.
- 4 MS. HAAGENSON: The sedimentation
- 5 basin.
- 6 MS. DEONARINE: Sedimentation
- 7 basin, yes.
- 8 CHAIRMAN KEANE: On Nassau
- 9 County.
- 10 MS. HAAGENSON: Actually Dan is
- 11 on the call. He could explain a little bit. It is
- 12 just a sedimentation basin. It's supposed to be
- 13 dredged soon; correct Dan?
- 14 MR. FUCCI: Yes. That's correct,
- 15 Nora. It's with the requirements contract with a
- 16 work order's completed. The funding is in place,
- 17 it's ready to go. They had to order what they call
- 18 a bladder dam or a water dam to obviously dam off
- 19 the stream before it comes into the basin and then
- 20 bypass pump from the stream around the sediment
- 21 basin into the pond so we can empty out the
- 22 sediment basin and remove the material. So you
- 23 should have that bladder dam or that water dam
- 24 shortly and then we'll get in there. It'll be
- 25 before the summer. I mean, you know, I can see

- within a month or two we'll be done. And I'll
- 3 certainly, Nora, give you a heads-up.
- 4 MS. HAAGENSON: Okay. Thank you
- 5 for that.
- 6 MS. WILSON-PINES: You have
- 7 anything about the Kudzu? Kudzu that's growing
- 8 along the banks of the sedimentation basin.
- 9 MR. FUCCI: I don't know. I'll
- 10 look when I get there. You know, that was not part

- 12 from the -- what's that, Circle Drive there or

- 3 Park.
- 4 MS. WILSON-PINES: Yeah. I know.
- 5 And I'm sorry to put you on the spot, Dan, but it's
- 6 been about five years and nobody from the county is
- 7 paying any attention. And right now it's spread
- 8 way up into the preserve area. And that's an
- 9 invasive that we don't really want to get out of
- 10 control on Long Island. That's the vine that ate
- 11 the south.
- MR. FUCCI: Yeah. It's --
- 13 CHAIRMAN KEANE: [Inaudible) West
- 14 Virginia.
- 15 MR. FUCCI: It's everywhere. I
- 16 mean, it's all along the stream corridors and --
- 17 MS. WILSON-PINES: Yeah.
- 18 MR. FUCCI: -- North and South
- 19 Shore. It's in the Catskills. I go trout fishing,
- 20 I go fly fishing along the river. It's all over the
- 21 place. It's everywhere unfortunately. It's
- 22 already taken hold --
- 23 MS. WILSON-PINES: Well, that's
- 24 mostly Japanese not weed. The kudzu is more
- 25 limited for now.

- 3 MR. BRAUN: This is Kevin from
- 4 the Town North Hempstead. Can I offer a suggestion
- 5 to Nora?
