11	Manhasset Bay Protection Committee.
12	MS. SHEEHAN: I'm Di
13	CHAIRMAN KEANE: And I'm Bob
14	Keane. Sorry. I'm Bob Keane. I'm the chairman
15	for Port Washington North.
16	MS. SHEEHAN: I'm Dianne Sheehan.
17	I'm a trustee for the Village of Plandome Heights.
18	MS. HAAGENSON: I'm Nora
19	Haagenson. I'm the Mayor of the Village of Baxter
20	Estates.
21	MS. WILSON-PINES: Jennifer
22	Wilson-Pines, the Village of Manor Haven.

- 8 MS. MENDELSON: Annie Mendelson,

- 10 MR. KLYCE: I'm Stephen Klyce.
- 11 I'm just a guest at this meeting. I have a few
- 12 hats, but I'm just a guest.

- 4 MS. ARNOLD: Yeah, I'm just here
- 5 to listen, kind of see how the meeting is run. And
- 6 then my main goal is to kind of be the liaison
- 7 between the municipalities and the Long Island
- 8 Sound Study.
- 9 MS. DEONARINE: (Zoom inaudible.)
- 10 Jill Monoson will also -- if she's able, she will
- 11 be joining us. She's having technical
- 12 difficulties. She is restarting her computer.
- 13 Well, we do have a quorum even without her.
- 14 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Okay. And
- 15 Jill's --
- 16 MR. BRAUN: May I ask someone to
- 17 introduce herself?
- 18 MS. WILDER: Samantha Wilder,
- 19 intern.
- MS. DEONARINE: Oh.
- 21 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Hi, Sam. All
- 22 right. So I guess the first thing we want to do is
- just rattle off some -- everybody has the agenda.

- 13 CHAIRMAN KEANE: I'm just
- 14 kidding. It's -- do what you got to do. And I

- 4 when we have a meeting at Town Hall, it becomes
- 5 problemsome to get a quorum. We've had a quorum
- 6 for -- longstanding during this whole pandemic, so
- 7 I applaud all of you and I just want to thank you.
- 8 So again, once the fall comes up, I'm not sure
- 9 what's going to happen. So again, it will depend.
- 10 I'm not -- I was joking about my birthday. It's
- 11 not a big deal.
- 12 MR. ERTEL: Mike Ertel, Village
- of Sands Point, motion to make all future meetings
- 14 by Zoom.
- 15 MS. HAAGENSON: Second.
- 16 MS. DEONARINE: I don't think we
- 17 could do that legally. Not yet, anyway.
- 18 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Let me call in
- 19 the Governor.
- 20 MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. I know the
- 21 Town is -- I don't know when exactly they're going
- 22 back to in person, but our next Water Plan Advisory
- 23 Committee meeting in September is going to be in
- 24 person. So it's definitely --
- 25 MS. HAAGENSON: Our Village

- 2 meeting in September will be in person.
- 3 MS. DEONARINE: All right.
- 4 There's two -- there is also two other things I
- 5 wanted to draw your attention to. March and April
- 6 are -- the second and third Thursdays of both of
- 7 those months don't work for whichever reason. So
- 8  $\,$  -- 2022 calendar. So we can meet -- actually, I
- 9 would recommend the April meeting going for the
- 10 latest date because we usually cancel the May
- 11 meeting for the Joint Protection Committee. And
- 12 then in March -- I don't have written down March --
- 13 well, the third Thursday, is St. Patrick's Day, so
- 14 that wouldn't work. And the second -- and so it's

- 9 CHAIRMAN KEANE: And is this one
- 10 where you give a patch for participation for Boy

- MS. DEONARINE: Yes. And so
- 13 we've got a patch from two years ago, and then I
- 14 purchased a new patch for this last year, which I

- 19 CHAIRMAN KEANE: All right. So
- 20 moving along, the next thing is the boat tour. Yes
- 21 or no?
- MS. DEONARINE: We usually have
- it in June, but obviously we were not comfortable
- 24 doing that this year due to COVID. So I suggested
- 25 a date and a rain date. Are we comfortable doing

- 2 that? it's going to -- it would have to be masks
- 3 off because we eat.
- 4 MS. HAAGENSON: When would you
- 5 have to give him a deposit?
- 6 MS. DEONARINE: I don't know.
- 7 August? September? Though usually he just gets a
- 8 check for the whole thing in --
- 9 MS. HAAGENSON: Oh, but you're
- 10 going to have -- but you'd have to book the date.
- 11 MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. So I'm
- 12 realizing -- this is the last meeting so I'd have
- 13 to ask for money for it. And it's probably around
- 14 two grand.
- 15 MR. BRAUN: This is Kevin Braun
- 16 with the Town of North Hempstead. I don't know how
- 17 anybody else feels, but I'm going to think -- I'm
- 18 going to suggest or at least make my opinion known
- 19 that we should hold off this year and figure out
- 20 something for next year. It's a short timeline.
- 21 People necessarily aren't exactly comfortable,
- 22 especially on a boat. Even though it's outside,
- 23 it's limited quarters. So that's just my two
- 24 cents. I'd say we hold off until the following

- 17 CHAIRMAN KEANE: All right. So

- 19 MS. DEONARINE: That's a no.
- 20 MS. HAAGENSON: Yeah. Correct.
- 21 CHAIRMAN KEANE: All right. No.
- 22 7: Letters to Villages about dues structure.
- MS. HAAGENSON: Yeah.
- 24 MR. BRAUN: Have had it.
- MS. DEONARINE: So at our April

- 2 meeting we had discussed this letter to Mayor
- 3 Lopatkin, who was very frustrated to find that the
- 4 IMA did not change the dues structure. So the
- 5 member representatives sent it -- I drafted a
- 6 letter, and then the representatives edited it
- 7 yesterday. And so this is kind of like the final
- 8 version. It's pretty much the same as what Mike
- 9 Ertel suggested except for the red line strike-out.
- 10 And then I was also not sure -- and then -- so
- 11 there's two follow-up questions. I don't think we
- 12 actually have to vote on it, but I wanted input.
- 13 Do we send it to all the Villages, or just her? To
- 14 Kensington, I mean. And do we include minutes from
- 15 our meeting?
- 16 MR. BRAUN: This is Kevin from the
- 17 Town of North Hempstead. We send it -- my opinion
- 18 is we just send it to them. We don't necessarily
- 19 have to bring it to anybody else's jurisdiction,
- 20 notification, anything like that. And I don't
- 21 think you need to send the meeting minutes. We're
- 22 dealing with one individual Village. We've been
- 23 catering to them. And I think this should be
- 24 resolved with this letter. My opinion.
- 25 MR. ERTEL: Mike Ertel. I agree

- 2 with Kevin wholeheartedly. One other issue.
- 3 Jennifer suggested, I believe, an e-mail chain
- 4 mentioning the EMS costs. Did we want to include
- 5 that? I didn't know if we need to. But I thought
- 6 that seemed compelling. We trust that you find
- 7 that the value provided by these -- whatever
- 8 terminology, you know, is -- something.
- 9 MS. WILSON-PINES: Yeah, I think
- 10 that something like the value of the services you
- 11 receive on your mandatory MS4 permit with the
- 12 State, the people who can whack you with a \$10,000
- 13 fine for every day of non-compliance.
- 14 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Not that we have
- 15 a DEC representative with us.
- MS. WILSON-PINES: No.
- MS. SHEEHAN: Okay. Can I ask --
- 18 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Sorry, Mary.
- MS. SHEEHAN: This is Dianne. Is
- this a new mayor?
- 21 MS. DEONARINE: No. She's been
- 22 around for like ten years.
- 23 MS. SHEEHAN: Okay. Because, and
- 24 I know that I've mentioned this before. I don't
- 25 want a letter sent to the Village of Plandome

- 2 Heights, because you're only --
- 3 MS. HAAGENSON: Opening a can of
- 4 worms.
- 5 MS. SHEEHAN: -- you're only
- 6 opening a can of worms that Ken is fully aware of,
- 7 because I bring it to his attention often. And so
- 8 as long as he knows about it -- he's agreed that

- 11 Bob Keane. So -- I mean, I think I had that

- 10 well." But I think in the end it was fine. So this
- 11 letter may be -- now it's two months later?
- 12 MR. BRAUN: This is Kevin from
- 13 Town of North Hempstead. I'm going to say if we
- 14 continue on this conversation, it's going to
- 15 continue on, and I'm going to suggest that this
- 16 letter be sent only to them and that we consider
- 17 the matter closed.
- 18 Further, I would like to let know
- 19 -- Mike Ertel know that he is being recorded, and
- 20 that him agreeing with me so much is going to be
- 21 held against them.
- MR. ERTEL: Mike Ertel, I agree
- 23 with Kevin, and now that we look at it, perhaps we
- 24 don't need this last sentence because it sounds
- 25 like it's really been already addressed by Bob in

- 2 his conversation.
- 3 MS. WILSON-PINES: Yeah.
- 4 MR. ERTEL: So maybe this last
- 5 sentence is not -- I like the idea, Jennifer. I'm
- 6 sorry I brought it up. But now that I hear this,
- 7 maybe we don't need it.
- 8 MS. WILSON-PINES: Well --
- 9 MR. ERTEL: Why open a can of
- 10 worms?
- 11 CHAIRMAN KEANE: This is Bob
- 12 Keane again, and actually I'm going back and
- 13 rethinking it. And I think the point is that we're
- 14 indicating that we met in April, we talked about
- it, and we decided that we didn't need it. So I
- 16 think the letter actually is important, because
- 17 that was a point that she asked -- she tasked me
- 18 with, was seeing if a sub-committee was needed, so
- 19 I misspoke. So I apologize. I think it should
- 20 still be sent.
- 21 MR. ERTEL: Well, I'm sorry, Bob.
- 22 I just meant this last sentence that we're just
- 23 adding now about -- that we trust the value of the
- 24 MS4, so on and so forth. Just that portion.
- 25 MR. BRAUN: To me, it doesn't

- 2 matter either way.
- 3 MS. DEONARINE: All right. I'm
- 4 going to remove it because it's kind of -- I don't
- 5 know -- threatening?
- 6 MS. WILSON-PINES: Sometimes less
- 7 is more.
- 8 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Such a thing as
- 9 clear eyes.
- MR. BRAUN: Once again, this is
- 11 Kevin from the Town of North Hempstead. I just
- 12 want to reiterate if this Mayor has been there for
- 13 ten years -- and Jennifer Wilson-Pines can attest
- 14 to this -- Kensington got fined \$10,000 already
- 15 previously for not adhering to the Phase II
- 16 stormwater requirements. That was some years ago.
- 17 But I think that dictates the value that we offer,
- 18 considering they had to deal with a particular
- 19 issue.
- 20 CHAIRMAN KEANE: \$10,000 is a
- 21 couple years' membership.
- MS. DEONARINE: Was Susan
- 23 Lopatkin the Mayor at that time? When there was a
- 24 --
- MS. CHU: Yes. She's been Mayor

- 2 for 14 years.
- 3 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. Then she
- 4 should know, you know, especially if they incurred
- 5 that fine.
- 6 MS. WILSON-PINES: Or she
- 7 should've raised this question ten years ago.
- 8 MS. DEONARINE: Exactly.
- 9 MR. ERTEL: Mike Ertel, Village of
- 10 Sands Point.
- 11 Motion to approve this letter as
- 12 currently drafted and send it only to Kensington.
- 13 MR. BRAUN: Kevin Braun, (Zoom
- 14 inaudible) Hempstead, agrees.
- 15 MS. DEONARINE: All right. let

3	do you have that motion then, Sarah?
4	MS. DEONARINE: Well, I have it
5	down as, "Mike Ertel made a motion to send the
6	letter just to Kensington as amended."
7	CHAIRMAN KEANE: All those in
8	favor?
9	(Chorus of "ayes.")
10	CHAIRMAN KEANE: Oppose?
11	(No response.)
12	CHAIRMAN KEANE: Abstain?
13	(No response.)
14	CHAIRMAN KEANE: That motion
15	carries.
16	MR. BRAUN: I'd like to agree
17	with Mike Ertel one more time.
18	CHAIRMAN KEANE: Thanks, Kevin.
19	All right.
20	No. 8, Water Quality Improvement
21	Plan.
22	MS. DEONARINE: So you all know
23	that we put out an RFP through the Town and we had

three responses back, and that -- two really great

ones that rose above. So I think either way we go

- 2 we're really going to do well with whoever we
- 3 choose to do our Water Quality Improvement Plan.
- 4 So the sub-committee that is made up of Bob, Kevin,
- 5 Jennifer, and myself are reviewing it with the Town
- 6 -- are reviewing the applications with the Town.
- 7 And we're probably going to do interviews with our
- 8 top two applicants.
- 9 Unfortunately, that whole process
- 10 was not done in time for this meeting. And so I
- 11 want to propose the idea of the possibility of an
- 12 emergency summer meeting to vote on the contractor,
- 13 because we're really far behind on this grant due
- 14 to COVID. So I really wanted to ramp up and get it
- 15 moving in the fall, so we need to approve the
- 16 vendor this summer, hopefully.
- 17 MR. BRAUN: Sarah, this is Kevin
- 18 from the Town of North Hempstead. First, I would
- 19 suggest that you don't need to worry about the
- 20 deadline so much. I have a DOS grant or DEC grant.
- 21 Well, for the present company excluded, DOS grants,
- 22 that have been ten years in the making. So in
- 23 terms of being behind, I wouldn't worry so much.
- 24 That being said, the idea of an interview at this
- 25 time is a little off kilter with what most people

- 2 or most RFP processes happen.
- 3 MS. DEONARINE: All right.
- 4 MR. BRAUN: You only had the -- I
- 5 wanted to say this in an e-mail, but I figured we
- 6 should discuss it for here. Generally, when you
- 7 have three people or three firms that apply for it
- 8 and really there's only two legitimate ones, they
- 9 are just going to mimic what they said in their
- 10 RFP. You're not going to get any additional
- 11 knowledge. So basically you go with the
- 12 highest-ranked firm.
- 13 That being said, I would wait for
- 14 the suggestion of the Town Attorney or the counsel
- of the Town Attorney to suggest what we should do.
- 16 But generally, you don't interview them, because
- 17 they're not going to provide any really further
- 18 detail than what's in your RFP.
- 19 Interviews are something you do
- 20 when you hire somebody or you have an individual in
- 21 a firm where it's more creative as opposed to
- 22 scientific. Your RFP basically said, "This is what
- 23 you should do, and give us a price for it."
- 24 Generally, the interview is not going to elaborate
- 25 too much more on that with the exception of

- 2 providing you personalities, and that's not
- 3 necessarily science.
- 4 So I would suggest at this point
- 5 we wait for the opinion of the Town Attorney. If
- 6 they say, "It's up to you," we can decide as a
- 7 group, but I would suggest that that would prolong
- 8 the process even further.
- 9 MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- 10 CHAIRMAN KEANE: And Sarah, this
- 11 is Bob Keane. I'm sorry, I haven't been saying my
- 12 name every time I talked, but -- and I was ordered
- 13 to set -- state your name. Did the sub-committee
- 14 come up with a unanimous decision as to the top No.
- 15 1?
- MS. DEONARINE: No, not yet.
- 17 Moira (phonetic) has -- from the Town Attorney's
- 18 office has not yet combined all the -- or assessed
- 19 all the reviews, says there's one outstanding.
- 20 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Okay.
- 21 MS. DEONARINE: [Zoom inaudible)
- 22 that.
- 23 CHAIRMAN KEANE: And I will not
- 24 lie. I got you mine last night, so --
- 25 MS. DEONARINE: Yeah. Well, the

- 2 question is that -- are we going to wait? So
- 3 within the next month at most, we will have our
- 4 candidate or -- so we'll have chosen a vendor. If
- 5 the Committee needs to vote in order to move it to
- 6 the Town Board, which -- I don't know if they will
- 7 or not, but to move it back to the Town to get a
- 8 contract in place which takes forever also -- so do
- 9 we want to wait until the September meeting to vote
- on this or if we choose somebody over the summer,
- 11 have a quick meeting to vote on it?
- 12 CHAIRMAN KEANE: This has to be a
- 13 board meeting or could it be a sub-committee that
- 14 makes a decision to push it forward?
- 15 MS. DEONARINE: No, I think we
- 16 have to bring it to the whole Committee first.
- 17 MS. HAAGENSON: Yeah, submit
- 18 something to the Town Board.
- 19 MR. BRAUN: This is Kevin with the
- 20 Town of North Hempstead. What would happen is the
- 21 sub-committee provides this Committee their
- 22 recommendation. The recommendation is then
- 23 proceeded to the Town Board. The Town Board makes
- 24 the final decision. So I guess what I'm saying is
- 25 let's cross that bridge when we get to it. There's

- 2 no need to set a meeting at this point. I find
- 3 that in a town hall especially, this time -- since
- 4 COVID and everything, everything moves a lot slower
- 5 than you think. If you need to call an emergency
- 6 meeting, you do it. But you don't need to do it
- 7 now.
- 8 MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- 9 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Yeah, I think we
- 10 did the last -- sorry, this is Bob Keane. We did
- 11 the last meeting and I -- again, I thank everybody
- 12 for their quick response. Basically it was to get
- 13 the YSI approved so that we could have it for the
- 14 season, for sampling. And it was a five-minute
- 15 meeting on Zoom. I think Zoom, as long as it
- 16 continues to be an allowable resource, it could be
- 17 a quick meeting, just to approve something, so --
- MS. DEONARINE: All right. So --
- 19 okay. So then the Committee would be up for an
- 20 emergency meeting over the summer if we got -- made
- 21 a choice. Okay. All right. So then the next is
- 22 the updates in -- so the first one is the Long
- 23 Island Clean-Water Vendor Fair. It's going to be
- 24 held -- I just sent out an e-mail today --
- 25 Wednesday, July 14th, from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

- 2 at -- in Oyster Bay, at Fireman's Field. We are
- 3 going to have an educational table there. And I
- 4 can staff it, so -- if it does rain and we move to
- 5 July 15th, I'll have to leave about an hour early.
- 6 But like Jennifer said earlier, if it's a rain
- 7 date, it's probably not going to be well attended
- 8 any way. So -- but if somebody wants to come out
- 9 to Oyster Bay in the middle of the day on July 15th
- or on July 14th to keep me company, let me know.
- 11 CHAIRMAN KEANE: What day of the
- 12 week is that?
- 13 MS. DEONARINE: The 14th is a
- 14 Wednesday and the 15th is a Thursday.
- 15 FEMALE SPEAKER: I can do a
- 16 Wednesday, I think.
- 17 MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- 18 FEMALE SPEAKER: But I can't -- I
- 19 work on Thursdays.
- 20 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. Okay. All
- 21 right. So the next update is 20 -- we still don't
- 22 have all the 2021 dues. They're coming in slowly.
- 23 One check was lost in the mail, so we're going to
- 24 have to track that down. The same with the interim
- 25 Municipal Agreement. They kind of come in

- 2 randomly, the signed copies.
- 3 So I'm still collecting
- 4 signatures, and then Nassau County will be the last
- 5 to sign. So we have funding for water quality
- 6 monitoring projects with DEC, and I'm working on
- 7 our first submission for reimbursement, but it's
- 8 looking like we're not going to get all of our
- 9 expenses -- less of our expenses qualify for
- 10 reimbursement than I was originally anticipating.
- 11 So we're probably not going to be taking full
- 12 advantage of this grant.
- 13 And so there was discussion with
- 14 the other protection committees, because it was a
- 15 grant for all the protection committees, about some
- 16 sort of project we could pull together that would
- 17 benefit all the protection committees, but I don't
- 18 have any information on that. So probably
- 19 September. So that's the update on that. And then
- 20 Seabin -- the Town approved adding to the contract
- 21 between the Town and Myron (phonetic) Marine.
- 22 Myron Marine protects the Town's moorings every
- 23 year. So they approved adding the Seabin into the
- 24 contract for Myron Marine to install and remove for
- 25 us, but I have not heard if the Seabin has been

- 2 installed. So that's what --
- 3 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Sarah, this is
- 4 Bob Keane. But we anticipate it being installed
- 5 relatively soon in the same location as last year?
- 6 MS. DEONARINE: Yes. Well, two
- 7 years ago. Last year --
- 8 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Right. Sorry,
- 9 two years ago. And then that's going to contribute
- 10 to hopefully Sarah having -- I mean, Samantha
- 11 having some sort of ability to assess what works
- 12 and --
- MS. DEONARINE: Yes.
- 14 CHAIRMAN KEANE: -- I remember
- 15 the first year we had a lot of people stealing the
- 16 nets for crabbing, and hopefully -- I think I was
- 17 told that a camera is being put down there. Is
- 18 that still true?
- 19 MS. DEONARINE: Well, that kind
- 20 of -- actually, I forgot about that. That kind of
- 21 fell back to the back burner. I got a lock for it.
- 22 So I might reach out again. I keep reaching out.
- 23 I haven't heard back. But getting a lock on it
- 24 sooner rather than later is probably best.
- 25 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Okay. Thank

- 2 you.
- 3 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. And that's
- 4 all from me.
- 5 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Okay. Do we
- 6 have any municipal updates?
- 7 (No response.)
- 8 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Anybody?
- 9 MS. HAAGENSON: They -- actually
- 10 Bob, for Baxter Estates, the County is dredging the
- 11 sedimentation basin of Baxter's Pond as we speak.
- 12 The whole pond, which desperately needs to be
- 13 dredged, is not part of this, but at least a
- 14 sedimentation basin is being done now.
- 15 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. Has there
- 16 been any movement on the County for dredging all of
- 17 Baxter Pond?
- 18 MS. HAAGENSON: No. From what we
- 19 heard, that is not at all imminent. And the last
- 20 time it was dredged we think was 1999. So it's --
- 21 you know, 22 years. It desperately needs it. But
- 22 this is not going to happen soon. It's very
- 23 expensive to do from what they say.
- 24 MS. WILSON-PINE: Yeah, I think
- 25 it was Barbara Johnson that got it done the first

- 2 time.
- 3 MS. HAAGENSON: Yeah. So I don't
- 4 know when. It is so needs it, but...
- 5 CHAIRMAN KEANE: This is Bob
- 6 Keane. So -- but I think the whole point of that
- 7 sediment trap for the pond was to hopefully catch
- 8 the sediment. But if that's not maintained, then
- 9 obviously the sediment's still going to go in. So
- 10 hopefully if they keep maintaining the trap for the
- 11 pond, you won't have any additional sediments.
- MS. HAAGENSON: Well --
- MS. WILSON-PINE: There's a --
- 14 the Island has extended about 50 feet.
- 15 MS. HAAGENSON: Yeah. It's --
- MR. BRAUN: Bob, from the Town of
- 17 North Hempstead. Nora, just to clarify, I think
- 18 there's just a trash net or trash holder. I don't
- 19 know if there's a sedimentation basin. I don't
- 20 know if there's swirl separator over there.
- 21 MS. HAAGENSON: What they told me
- 22 is that they're digging -- they're taking that, and
- 23 then they're digging out all of the silt from the
- 24 bottom. And I don't know how many truck loads --
- 25 many, it seems to me -- but they have said that

- they will do that. They think they're going to be
- 3 finished tomorrow. I don't know if they are, but
- 4 that's what they said. And they started yesterday.
- 5 They said it was a three-day job. So we'll see.
- 6 CHAIRMAN KEANE: So Kevin, before
- 7 the pond comes down from the stream, it enters into
- 8 like a wider opening area. Then that goes --
- 9 funnels through that bar screen and the racks that
- 10 get cleaned, that collect the garbage. And there's
- 11 like a bridge that goes over that. So then that
- 12 feeds the pond.
- MR. BRAUN: Yeah, I am sorry. I
- 14 thought you were suggesting there was a sediment
- 15 basin or sediment trapping device like a swirl
- 16 separator or a [zoom inaudible .
- 17 CHAIRMAN KEANE: No, it's just
- 18 that area, pre-effluent discharge into the pond,
- 19 which collects the material.
- 20 MR. BRAUN: Right.
- 21 MS. WILSON-PINES: Right. I was
- 22 able to -- I sent Nora a picture that I took
- 23 earlier this year of some kids standing on the
- 24 pond.
- 25 MS. HAAGENSON: Yeah.

- 4 MS. HAAGENSON: Yeah.
- 5 MS. DEONARINE: Who is the
- 6 President of the Baxter Pond Foundation?
- 7 MS. HAAGENSON: Nancy Comer.
- 8 MS. DEONARINE: Okay. And is she
- 9 the one that -- I'll get in touch with if I want to
- 10 go visit the pond, have a guided tour?
- 11 MS. HAAGENSON: Yes. Yes. Nancy
- is the one, if you do want to come down. She'd
- 13 love to have your come.
- MS. DEONARINE: Okay.
- 15 MS. WILSON-PINE: Yeah. And I
- 16 asked the County about the fact that there's a
- 17 massive kudzu infestation which has now spread up
- 18 into the preserve. And again, they don't want to
- 19 hear about it.
- 20 MS. HAAGENSON: I know. It's --
- 21 you know, we could've -- Dan isn't here this
- 22 evening or we could ask him about it, but he's not
- 23 here.
- 24 CHAIRMAN KEANE: I think Dan has
- 25 a shovel and he's digging out your ponds, Nora. He

- 2 kept promising, and I don't think he could face you
- 3 if he didn't do it.
- 4 MS. HAAGENSON: I know.
- 5 MR. BRAUN: I saw the heavy
- 6 equipment the other day. They're all -- all the
- 7 backhoes are there.
- MS. HAAGENSON: Yeah, it's --
- 9 CHAIRMAN KEANE: If Dan -- if
- 10 you're actually reading this transcription, I'm
- 11 only joking.
- 12 MR. BRAUN: You are being
- 13 recorded.
- 14 CHAIRMAN KEANE: That's why I
- 15 just clarified. All right. Any other municipal
- 16 updates?
- 17 MR. BRAUN: Kevin from the Town
- 18 of North Hempstead. We have no update.
- 19 CHAIRMAN KEANE: All right then.
- 20 MS. DEONARINE: Just --
- 21 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Is somebody
- 22 going to add something?
- 23 (No response.)
- 24 CHAIRMAN KEANE: Actually, while
- 25 we're here, I guess before we ask for a motion to

- 2 adjourn, I know Mary, you've been on this call. Is
- 3 there anything that you'd like to add or contribute
- 4 or question? Or -- you've been very patient and I
